New Records Set By First National

First National Bank of Oregon's earnings for the first quarter of 1965 approached the record established during the first quarter of 1964, it was announced by Ralph J. Voss, president.

Voss also revealed the bank established new all time records in deposits, loans and resources. Compared with the first quarter of 1964, deposits climbed more than \$114 million to a new high of \$1,133,123,802. They also exceeded the December 31, 1964 total which was \$1,132,979,988. The bank's 101 statewide offices reported loans outstanding on March 31 of \$699,146,049, a gain of more than \$57 million over the last March total of \$641,934,895 and also \$20 million greater than year end figures.

Resources continued to top the \$1 billion mark with a record total of \$1,261,449,566.

"For the first three months of 1965, expanded loan volume made possible by growth in deposits largely offset the increased expense attributable to higher interest paid on time deposits," Voss said.

The reasons for establishing this tax levy are for the payment of teachers and administrator's salaries, supplies and equipment for the classrooms, operation costs of the school plant and amounts required for the payment of teacher retirement obligations all as required by the Laws of the State of Oregon.

The votes shall be by ballot, upon which shall be marked "Tax Levy" () and the word "Yes" and "Tax Levy" and the word "No" and the voter shall place a cross (with an X in it) between the word "Tax Levy" and the word "Yes" or between the word "Tax Levy" and the word "No" whichever indicates his choice.

AT THIS ELECTION WE WILL ALSO VOTE TO ELECT TWO DIRECTORS FOR A 4 YEAR TERM.

Voters shall vote in the precinct listed which closest approximates their regular School District or Union High District Voting Poll.
