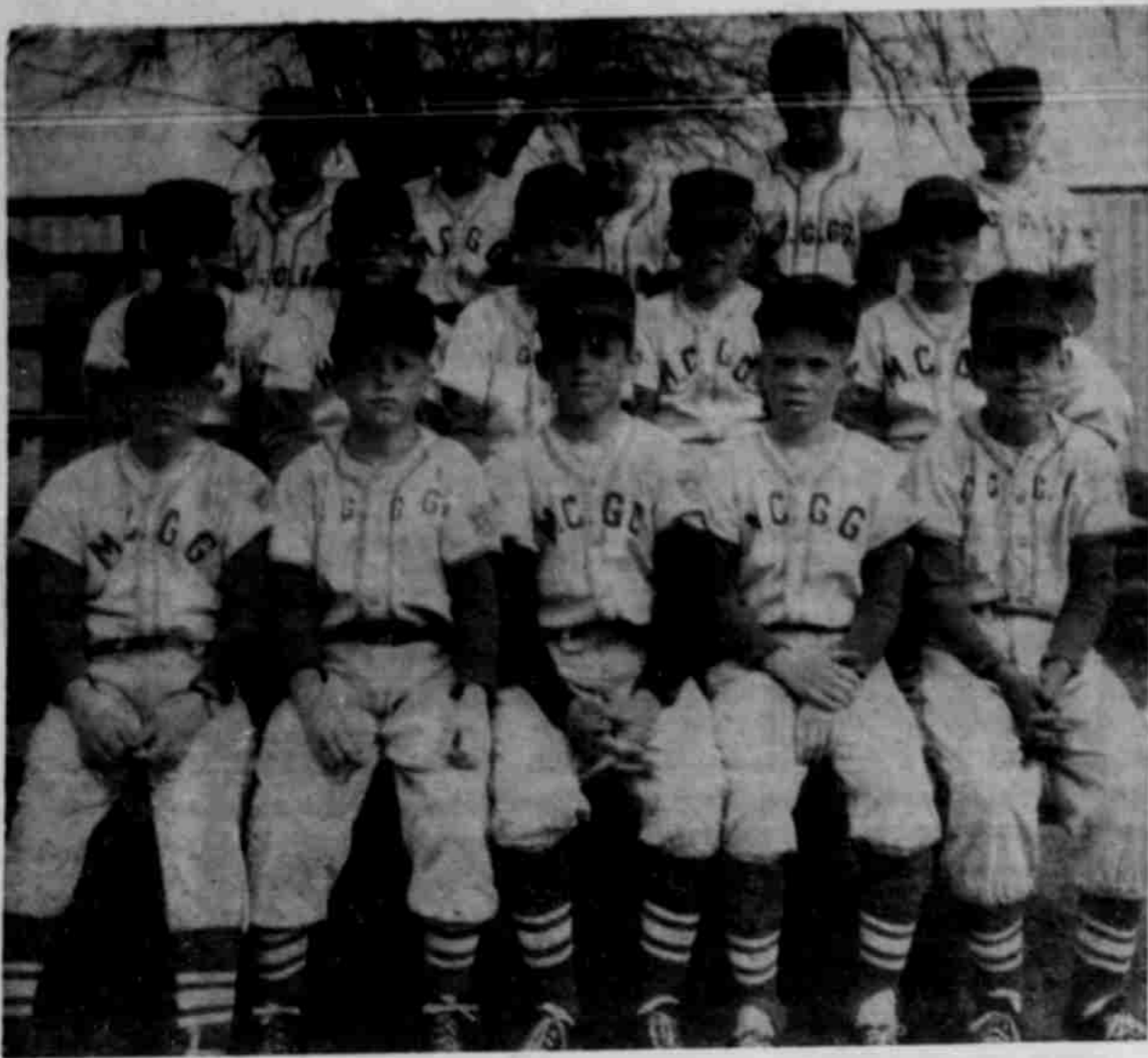


Little Leaguers to Open Season Here Saturday



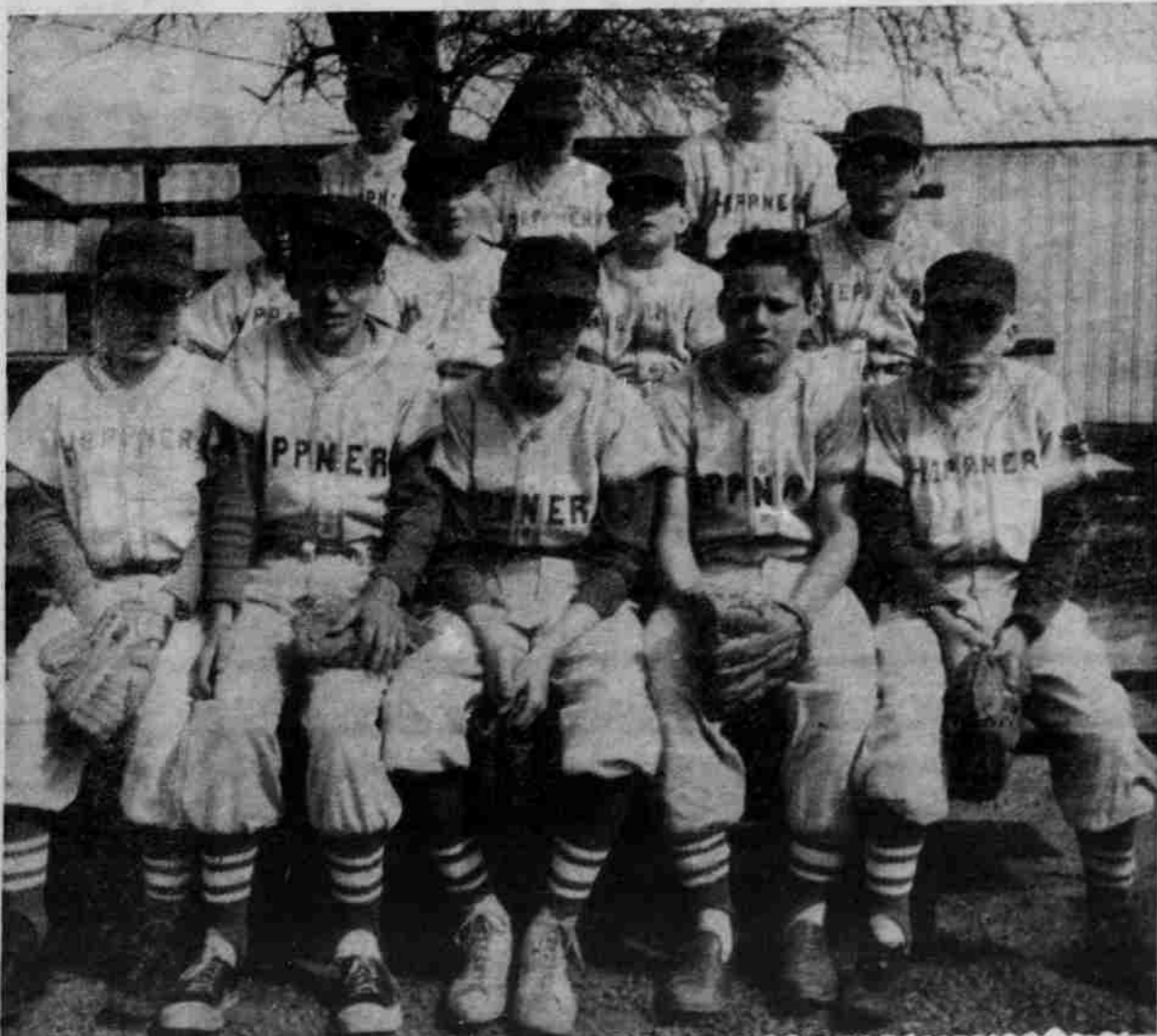
