

Committee Reports Given At CowBelle Luncheon

Committee reports and visitation of two state officers of the Oregon CowBelles association were highlights of the annual spring meeting of the Morrow County CowBelles last Monday at the luncheon meeting at the Heppner Grill dining room, with Mrs. Ralph Beamer presiding. Special guests were Mrs. Marge Hankins, state president of Baker, and Jean Weight, state secretary, of Dufur.

The "Do It Yourself Barbecue" committee reported that a request for the building of a barbecue grill at the fair grounds had been presented, along with a blueprint and estimated costs, to the Morrow County Fair board by representatives of the CowBelles and Livestock Growers but to date no action had been taken. Other organizations were to be contacted for their assistance in stressing need for such a grill and for its use by the public at the fair grounds.

Mrs. Ron Currin, chairman of the Father of the Year committee, reported that Dr. L. D. Tibbles had been selected. The date to honor this year's winner, along with a barbecue or family picnic, will be announced later. A committee is to be appointed to assist in revision of some parts of the contest.

Beef promotion chairman, Mrs. Rosella Lindsay, reported on "Beef for Father's Day," showing some samples of material available for advertising in stores and papers, and getting approval for the purchase of materials needed. The stamping of monthly statements from the local banks was discussed.

Beef promotion in the schools was discussed by Mrs. Wavel Wilkinson, chairman, who reported money charts and cookbooks sent to the home economics classes in the Morrow county high schools.

Prizes will again be given for the \$100 dinner 4-H winners, and it was also voted to sponsor prizes for junior and senior leather work exhibited in open class.

A letter was read from State Rep. Irvin Mann thanking the Morrow and Gilliam county CowBelles for the rib roast dinner served to both houses of the legislature one day during the present session. This is a project carried on one day a week during the time legislature is in session and is under the sponsorship of the State CowBelles.

A legislator representing the sponsoring county or counties is given the floor to advertise the agriculture, industries and recreation of those counties—a form of public relations in a "meat" package. Rep. Mann was a sponsor of the Meat Labeling Bill which is now a law in Oregon.

Report of the budget committee by Mrs. Helen Currin, chairman, was approved. For the first time, \$30 was given towards the traveling expenses of the State CowBelle president.

Mrs. Hankins, state president, was presented information on state beef promotion projects.
