

Heppner Budget Remains Within 6 Percent Limit

\$8000 in the fund was held at that amount, plus interest accumulated. No additional funds are provided for this purpose in the new budget.

The general government department shows an increase in requirements to \$26,300 from \$23,255, and the police department is up slightly with provision for a new police car. Total requirements in this department are set at \$17,880 as compared with \$16,140 for the current year.

An item of \$1000 is added to the fire department budget for the purchase of fire hose and amount provided for personal services is \$2,100 as compared with \$1,600 for the current year in this department.

Water department budget is down to \$42,180 from \$46,100 for the current year and the sewer department is down to \$17,720 from \$19,250.

Budget hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, June 1, at 8 p.m. in the city hall at which time any resident may appear to remonstrate or speak on the budget.

Glenn Ward is chairman of the budget committee.

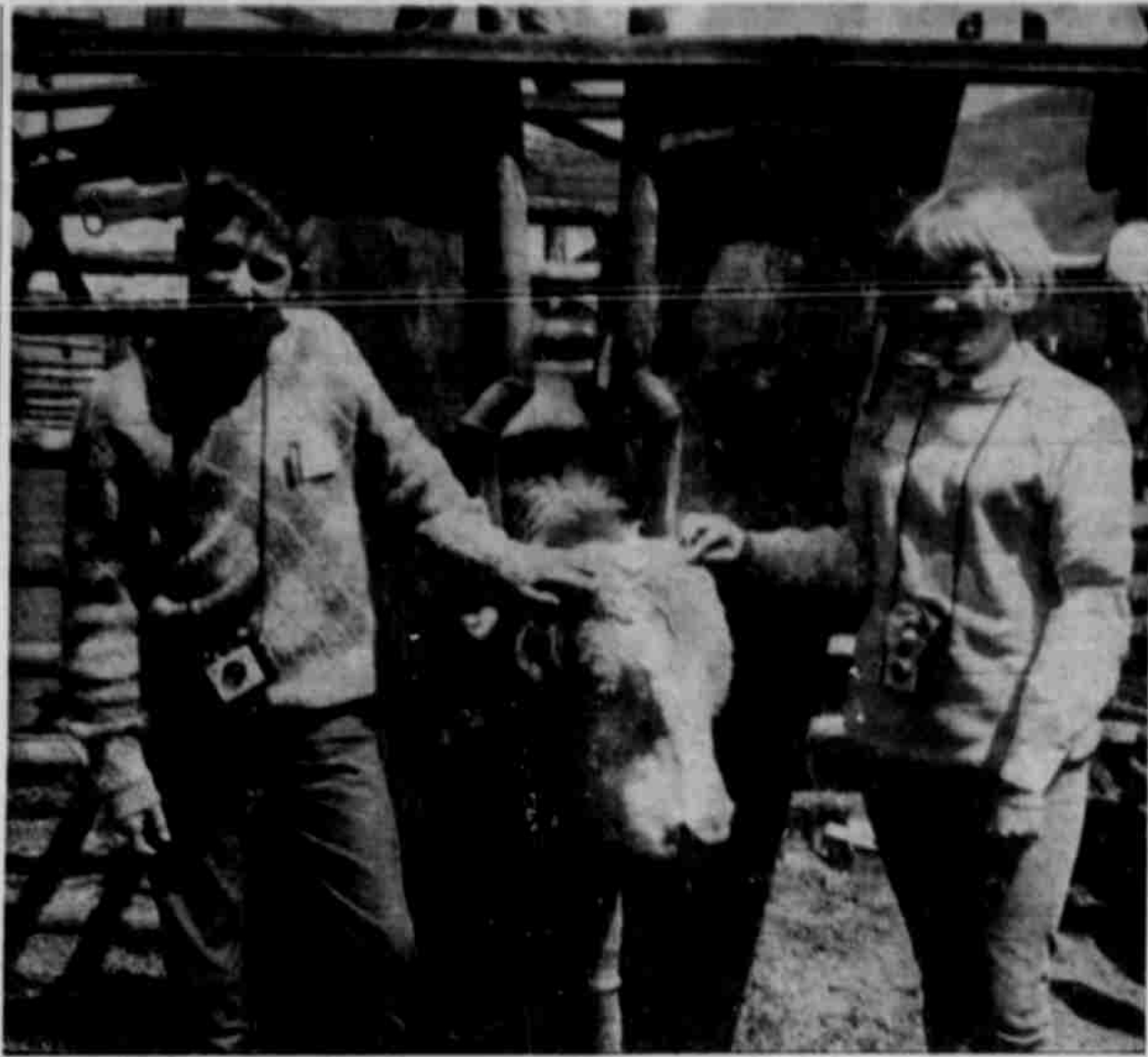
