Students Delight In IFYE Reports Of Jamaica Life

"There is no racial discrimination . . . The country is pro-U. S. and anti-Communist . . . The people are receptive to new ideas and eager to improve their agricultural production practices . . ."

Nellie Van Calcar of Coos Bay made such statements last week, describing her experiences as an International Farn Youth Exchange delegate to Jamaica.

Some 800 Morrow county people enjoyed Miss Van Calcar's presentation which, in addition to pictures and displays, included recordings of the Jamaican national anthem and some very rhythmic toe-tappin' dance music typical of her host country.

Some of our teachers seemed surprised that Jamaican schools have about 100 pupils per teacher. Free public education is offered at the primary grade level but secondary education must be paid for by the student, similar to college here.

With willingness to try new things and her interest in farming practices, Nellie was able to describe many interesting details of Jamaican agriculture. Bananas, coffee, cocoa, coconut and sugar cane are some leading crops. Poultry and egg products are in great demand and several farmers are going into that business. Many beef cattle and also a few dairy cattle are raised. Jamaica has developed its own breeds of cattle by crossing other breeds with the Brangmans to give tropical adaptability. These include the Jamaica Blacks (Angus), Jamaica Reds (Red Poll) and Jamaica Hopes (Jersey).

Miss Van Calcar also assisted with 4-H training programs in cake and bread baking, demonstrations, and sewing with patterns which are just coming into use on the island. Other

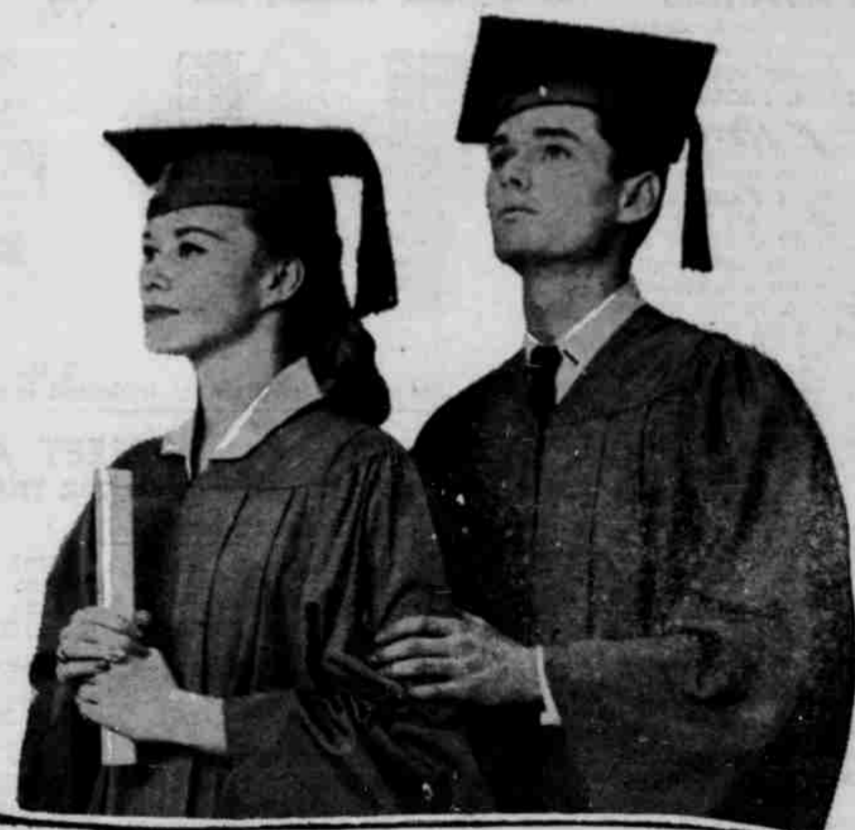
