# Junior Stock Growers To Enter Show, June 6-9

While entries are down somewhat this year, Morrow county will be represented by 11 4-H livestock exhibitors, as well as a sizeable number of 4-H members, who will participate in the judging contest of the Junior Livestock Show and Sale.

The Junior Livestock Show, commonly known as the Wheat League Show, as it is sponsored by the Oregon Wheat Growers League, will be held at The Dalles on June 6, 7, 8 and 9. The week will be full of 4-H activities, with a new event, livestock carcass judging, accompanying a carcass demonstration on Wednesday. Livestock judged on Monday will be slaughtered to use in this demonstration.

Beef, sheep and swine judging and showmanship contests, both 4-H and FFA, will be held Monday afternoon, Tuesday, and Wednesday morning, with the auction sale Wednesday afternoon and Wednesday evening. Sheep and swine will sell during the afternoon, beef during the evening.

These members represent the Buttercreek Junction, Hoof and Horn, Blackhorse, Ione and Rhea Creek 4-H Livestock clubs.

### Sod Water-ways Aid In Checking Run-offs

We have commented from time to time about the many conservation practices that have been or are being established this spring, many of them as a result of erosion from the heavy run-off in the late December "chinook." While we haven't added up the acres of grass seedings throughout the county, it would run much over 1,000, I am sure.

In checking some of these seedings, it is surprising to see the excellent stands, even though the spring has been dry. One excellent seeding can be found at the Walt Jacobs ranch in the south Ione area. Walt seeded 5 1/2 acres of sod water-way with Pubescent Wheat grass that will provide for excess run-off without gullying as it becomes better established this summer. Where this water-way ends, Lloyd Howton has an extended seeding through his adjoining field. Walt has another small water-way, seeded broadcast, that is doing very well. Since it is almost impossible to keep all of the water in the field especially in such run-offs as occurred this last December, sod-water-ways are one means of getting rid of it without losing a lot of soil.

### Three Events of Interest Scheduled for Coming Month

Three events that are fast approaching, and should be put on your calendar as a reminder, are the annual spring meeting, Morrow County Wheat Growers Association; annual conservation and better farming practices tour; and the state conservation man of the year field day.

The annual spring meeting will be held at the Lexington Grange hall at 8:00 p.m. Thursday, June 3. An interesting program has been arranged with emphasis on foreign marketing, national farm programs and the county road program. Friday, June 4, will be the date of the annual tour which will feature many conservation practices both old and new. Persons participating will have an opportunity to see practices that were effective in the heavy run-off of December, 1964, and some of the practices being established

## Junior Livestock Show Plans Made At Annual Festival

Arrangements for up to 275 boys and girls in the 4-H and FFA divisions of the 19th annual Junior Livestock Show of the Oregon Wheat Growers League at The Dalles are nearing completion, announced Elmer Lierman, the general manager.

Wheat-fattened steers, lambs and hogs will be exhibited starting with the arrival of entries Sunday, June 6, and continuing with competitive events Monday and Tuesday and the final program on Wednesday morning followed that afternoon and evening by the auction sales.

The show will be held at the Seuffer Buildings in Wasco County Park, opposite The Dalles Dam, with the showgrounds entrance near The Dalles bridge. First held in 1946 under auspices of what was then the Eastern Oregon Wheat League, the show has continued to grow and now is regarded as the largest junior livestock show in Oregon, with both 4-H and FFA divisions.

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## Junior Hereford Field Day Set At Baker June 5

Juniors from all over Oregon will convene Saturday, June 5, at the famed Chandler Hereford Ranch near Baker, for the 3rd annual Oregon Junior Hereford Association field day, according to Stephen Wolfe, Wallowa, association president. All who are interested in Herefords are invited to attend, both adults and juniors.

Field day visitors will have the opportunity to see one of the good practical Oregon ranches which has been in the Chandler family for three generations. Founded in 1863 by George Chandler, father and grandfather of the present owners, Herbert and Charles Chandler, the 2700 acre ranch has been stocked with registered Herefords since 1889. At present, 350 registered cows and their offspring make their home on the beautiful ranch which lies in a valley between the 9,000 foot high peaks of the Elkhorn Mountains to the west, and the Cornucopia Mountains to the east.

Starting at 9:00 a.m., the morning program will be designed to train juniors in judging and selecting Hereford cattle. A contest featuring classes of bulls, females, fat steers, and show steer prospects, is open to all Oregon juniors under 21. 4-H and FFA groups are invited to bring as many teams and individuals as they wish.

Following a free lunch at noon, information on the ranch and cattle will be given by Herbert and Charles Chandler, Marshall Sellman, Watrous, New Mexico, president of the Amer-

ican Hereford Association will talk on "Your Future with Herefords."

Demonstrations and short talks on the afternoon program will give the juniors detailed information on selecting, feeding, grooming, and showing Herefords. Recognized authorities on these subjects will attend the field day to demonstrate various skills in caring for beef cattle. Association officials who will be assisting with the field day program are Steve Wolfe; Gary Hansen, Eagle Point, 1st vice president; Gary Forster, Tangent, 2nd vice president; Margaret Marks, Fossil, secretary; Linda Shumway, Milton-Freewater, reporter; and Directors, Gordon Eakin, Condon; Joe

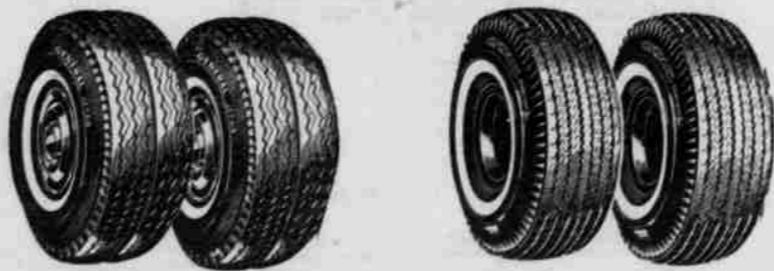
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
