

Massey Sets Vault Mark At Sub-district Meet

Heppner High school trackster Mickey Massey broke the oldest Heppner High school track mark on record when he vaulted 11 feet 5/8 inches at the Greater Oregon League sub-district at Moro Saturday.

Fourth was the best Heppner could do as a team, but Mickey placed second to beat Gary Connor's record of 10 feet 11 1/2 inches set in 1951.

Tim Driscoll, running with a bruised knee that kept him out of practice all week, broke Lee Fadberg's sub-district record in the 880 with a 2:02.9 time but the best he could manage was second in the race. Sophomore Jim Jacobs put the shot 44 feet 10 1/2 inches to gain a third place. The big boy is now only 7 1/2 inches off the school mark and he could come closer this week at the district meet in Burns. Heppner garnered 48 points to take fourth in the meet. Burns was the winner with 194 points.

'Pendleton 100' Air Races Stated

One of Air Racing's biggest events, the "Pendleton 100" international championship closed course stock plane races, will take place at the Pendleton Municipal Airport in Pendleton June 25-27.

Since 1963, the International Air Races have brought thousands of air enthusiasts to view one of the world's most spectacular sports.

Entrants will come from all parts of the United States and Canada to compete in the 100-mile, 25-lap race. A wide variety of 4-place stock airplanes will be entered.

The "Pendleton 100" is sponsored by members of the Umatilla chapter, Oregon Pilots association, headed by Dean Smith who has been hard at work these past months to make this the biggest event yet.

The International Championship Stock Plane Races were brought back for the first time since the days of the Cleveland Air Races by Duane Cole of the Cole Bros. International Air Show at Phoenix, Ariz., in 1963.

The races were moved in 1964 to Pendleton Municipal Airport, which was celebrating its 30th anniversary, and has come to be known simply as "The Pendleton 100."
