GOLD CUP RACE IN SEATTLE



SEATTLE—It is only fitting that a city blessed by three lakes within its boundaries and bordered on one side by the waters of Puget Sound should become the hydroplane capital of the world.

That is actually what has happened to Seattle, host this year of the \$50,150 Gold Cup classic, the World Series of hydroplane racing.

The Gold Cup will be staged August 8 on Lake Washington as the climax to the city's annual Seafair celebration July 30-August 8.

To most of the area's inhabitants the sight of water and the flashing speed of boats is as natural as the speed of water and the freeways to Los Angeles and the Top of the Mark to San Francisco.

Hundreds of thousands of spectators line the shores of Lake Washington to view the unlimited races from unparalleled vantage points along the shore and from the world-famous floating bridge.

Reaching speeds of 180 miles per hour on the straightaways, the king-sized racers slow down only to jockey for position around the corners of the three-mile course.

The prize, besides the money, will be a huge trophy coveted by every man who ever sat behind the wheel of one of these mechanical monsters.

In addition, a varied program of inboard and outboard races are staged on nearby Green Lake, which provides an ideal course and setting for the smaller boats.

Parents Urged To Get Needed Health Forms

Oregon school law requires all incoming first and ninth grade students to have a pre-school physical and dental examination, and to present the completed forms at the beginning of the school year, according to the Oregon State Board of Health.

Parents are urged to have the required examination done now, thus allowing time to complete needed immunizations or any needed corrective work which is indicated, and to avoid any last minute rush by waiting until just before school starts in Morrow county on September 7.

"Oregon Pupil Medical Record" or "Goldenrod" forms may be obtained in the office of local physicians, Morrow county health department, or county school office.

Completed forms should be brought to school at the time of entrance, or may be mailed to the health department office in Heppner.

Birth certificates (required for first graders) application forms are available in the health department or will be mailed upon request.
