**County's Service Businesses Gain**

Morrow county's 27 service establishments had total receipts of \$367,000 in 1963, an increase of five per cent from 1958, according to a report of the 1963 Census of Business just released by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. The last previous Census of Business covered operations during 1958.

The service trades in the Census of Business included those providing: Personal services to individuals, miscellaneous business services, auto repair and other auto services, and other repair services. Also included were motion picture production and distribution businesses, motion picture theaters, other amusement and recreation ser-

VICES, and hotels and motels. The selected service trade establishments in the county employed 25 persons (exclusive of proprietors) and had a payroll for the year of \$64,000. The state as a whole included 11,064 establishments with receipts of \$364,400,000.
