Rocket Speedway Sets Auto Races At Pilot Rock

Auto racing will be held at the Rocket Speedway, Pilot Rock, every other Saturday night throughout the summer. Don Peck, who is operating the speedway, announces.

Next racing program will be Saturday night, June 12, with time trials Saturday at 7:15 and races to follow.

Hardtops, handbuilt "from the ground up" and jalopies—modified stock cars—will perform in the races, Peck said.

A special event is scheduled for Saturday night, June 26, called a "Pie Race." Drivers stand by their cars at the start, each with a pie in his hand. When the signal is given to start, he eats part of the pie and then takes off for a lap, after which he must stop, get out and eat more pie, then take another lap. He then repeats the process. Winner is the one who finishes his pie first.

Ensuing dates for races are July 10, July 24, August 7, August 21, September 4, and September 11. Championship racing is set for Sunday afternoon, September 26, at the close of the season.

The speedway is a 1/4-mile paved track, and each racing program will be three to 3 1/2 hours long. Peck states. Racing fans who are interested will find exciting shows at each program, Peck promises.

Planning Council Budget Approved

Budget for the year 1965-66 was approved for the Mid-Columbia Planning Council at a meeting at Boardman Monday, according to Rupert Kennedy, The Dalles, executive secretary.

Counties and ports are to furnish \$10,000 and \$3,350 will be supplied by business firms interested in development. An interim budget was also approved.

Action was also approved to have representation in Washington, D. C., on its waterfront diversification plan. The group also considered action on Federal highway locations affecting the area, such as 82N and 12 from Missoula, Mont., to Boardman, connecting with 80N.

Site submissions for the Atomic Energy Commission's proposed national accelerator laboratory for research in high energy physics were discussed.

Present at the meeting were Dewey West, Boardman, president; D. R. (Sam) Cook, Pendleton, vice president; Wilbur Kelly, The Dalles, secretary-treasurer; Earl Hogg, Port of Arlington; Dr. Paul Vogt, Port of Arlington; Paul Jones, Heppner, Morrow county judge; and Kennedy, executive secretary.

Ullman Supports Riverfront Plan, Al Lamb Reports

Congressman Al Ullman expressed full support of the county planning commission's proposal for utilization of the Columbia River waterfront in Morrow county when Mayor Al Lamb visited him in Washington, D. C., last week, the mayor said Monday.

Chairman Clarence Rosewall and the commission has proposed a plan that would give the county more industrial sites on the riverfront than are allowed in Federal proposals.

"Congressman Ullman indicated that he would back Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield's proposals for the riverfront, which are at some variance with the federal plans for wildlife refuge," Mayor Lamb said. He referred to the engineers who have studied the waterfront for best utilization.

Mayor Lamb went to Washington as a director of the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives, attending a 2-day meeting. He was reelected as one of six directors from the northwest last year.

While there, he also visited the Department of Agriculture and said that he found strong indications that the wheat bill will have "smooth sailing" without much opposition.

He said that Congressman Ullman is "pretty happy" about the settlement of the redistricting of the second Congressional district. He has received many telegrams and letters from those located in Linn and Marion counties.

Curfew Talked At City Council

Matter of curfew enforcement came in for considerable discussion at the regular meeting of the city council Monday night.

Councilman Dave McLeod brought up the matter after, he reported, three objections had been voiced to him as a result of activities around town Saturday night.

Chief of Police Dean Gilman told of difficulties of enforcement of the curfew, which is a county ordinance that requires those below 18 to be off the streets after 11 p.m. on week nights and after midnight on Saturday.

The chief suggested that parents who do not know where their children are or who are concerned about them may call the city hall where a radio dispatcher is on duty every night of the week but one.

When this is done, the officer on duty can try to locate them, he said.

The chief said that the schools have been very good about notifying the department when activities might require students to be out after curfew. Some parents have also, by informing the police that a party in a home or some other activity might keep the youngsters out after hours.

The matter of parental responsibility was not overlooked in the discussion, someone pointing out that too many parents "don't care if their children are out after curfew."

Juveniles taken into custody by city officers must be turned over within a very short time to the juvenile counselor.
