## Wheat Growers Meeting Covers Many Subjects

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oiled projects such as the Boardman bombing range, the Raggs to Jordan elevator road on Rhea Creek, Willow Creek, and others, have been repaired to make them passable until funds are approved from Washington, D. C. He reported that plans are being formed to complete oiling to link main roads, and to oil in front of farm homes where dust is a problem.

John Welbes, executive vice-president, Oregon Wheat Growers League, summarized proposed national legislation which will result in a national farm program as it is considered by congress. He predicted no legislation before "a minute before midnight on August 1," as this is the date that the old farm program goes into effect if no new legislation is passed. At that time a wheat marketing referendum will be called which provides for a vote to see if wheat is supported at 50% of parity and the Anfusio amendment goes back into effect.

Welbes showed extreme concern for keeping urban congressmen better informed on the importance of agriculture in America. He pointed out that many did not understand well enough that many items such as REA and FHA loans are being charged to agriculture but no credit given when these loans are repaid with interest.

He pointed out that 60% of the projects now charged to agriculture cannot be rightly attributed, such as school lunch programs, food for peace, and other programs administered by the U. S. State Department.

Brief reports of all standing committee chairmen were given. Louis Carlson, chairman, membership and finance committee, reported that a fund raising drive was now under way in Morrow county with approximately 20 wheatgrowers making contact with their neighbors.

Additional funds are needed for legislative work in Washington and at home. A voluntary assessment of \$5.00, plus 3c per acre on the wheat allotment, is being solicited. Those wheatgrowers subscribing will receive the weekly National Association of Wheat Growers newsletter, which comes from Washington D. C., keeping wheatgrowers apprised of legislation and other matters of importance to the wheatgrowers on the National level.

## Traffic Detour, Closure Called

BOARDMAN — A resolution was passed last week by the Boardman City Council authorizing Mayor Dewey West and Ernael Mittelsdorf, recorder, to execute an agreement between the Oregon State Highway department and the council providing for the construction, operation, maintenance, etc., of a detour and a closure to traffic of that portion of the present Columbia River highway extending easterly from the west end of the detour within the city of Boardman. This would allow the contractor for construction of the new townsite to continue work on the railroad overpass, which would extend over the present highway.

Harry O'Donnell, president of the Morrow County Abstract and Title Company, met with the council and other interested persons to explain the title insurance program, and stated he would do everything he could to expedite the issuance of insured titles by his company.

Gene Pierce, president of the Bank of Eastern Oregon, who is handling escrow agreements, was also present at the meeting, and explained the program. He made the statement that people would be able to receive insurance titles and proceed within the next two weeks with purchasing property in the new townsite.

Ben Molle of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, was in the city all one day last week and stated that the corps is moving its south shore relocation office for the John Day project to Boardman within the next two weeks, and will be situated on the site of the old Smith Motel. The office employs from 35 to 40 personnel.
