Mrs. J. C. Walton Dies in Grandview

Mrs. J. C. Walton died Monday, June 14, in Grandview, Wn., at the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Paul J. Warren.

Vella Devin Walton was born November 27, 1882, near Bolivar, Mo. She was still a small child when her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Devin, came to this part of the West to make the family home. Being pioneers of the area, they shared a part in the history of Heppner.

Vella Devin received her education in the Heppner Public school, graduating in 1904 in a class of five. One member of this class was Len Gilliam, who still lives in Heppner.

She homesteaded a small acreage adjoining her father's ranch which he later purchased and which is now known as the Kirk & Robinson ranch.

In 1906 she married J. Clair Walton and for a time they made their home in Heppner, operating a farm in the Black-horse section. Clair's brother, Will Walton, and wife both lost their lives in the 1903 flood.

The Waltons moved to Yakima Valley after the birth of their first child. There Clair started work in the express office, a position he held until his death in June, 1949.

Mrs. Walton for many years owned and operated a grocery store in Yakima. A year ago her health began to fail and she remained in the home of her daughter, Alene.

Funeral services were Thursday, June 17, at the Hap Smith Mortuary in Grandview with burial beside her husband in the family plot in Yakima.

Among survivors are two daughters, Mrs. W. E. (Irene) Shecker of Richland, Wn.; and Mrs. Paul J. (Alene) Warren of Grandview; four sisters, Mrs. Letha Archer of Heppner, Mrs. Oral (Tena) Scott and Mrs. M. N. (Altha) Kirk, both of Hermiston, and Mrs. W. H. (Dessa) Hofstetter of Monmouth.

Preceding her in death in 1963 were a brother, O. A. Devin, and a sister, Ora Wyland, both of Heppner.
