Mr. Morris was formerly employed by the Union Pacific

Railroad for about 10 years and was a member of the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way No. 309.

He was born June 22, 1905, at Newberg and would have been 60 years of age on Tuesday of this week. On August 10, 1935, he was married to Mildred Wilson in Heppner.

Mrs. Morris was working in a restaurant at Arlington at the time of his death.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Mildred Morris; four daughters, Mrs. Edna Struthers of Heppner, Mrs. Edith Turner of Myrtle Beach, S. C., Mrs. Nolan of Lexington, and Doris Morris, Heppner; four sons, James A. Morris of Portland, Clifford L. Morris, Robert E. Morris and Randall D. Morris, all of Heppner; a sister, Mrs. Lulu French of Centralia, Wn.; and five grandchildren. Sweeney Mortuary of Heppner had charge of arrangements.
