Salter, a teacher for the past three years in the Forest Grove school system, will study the relationship of modern states with emphasis on the decline of colonialism and the rise of nationalism in Africa, Latin America, and Southeast Asia.

He is a graduate of Eastern Oregon College at La Grande.
