City Lets Contract On Street Project

Contract for improvement of Heppner city streets was awarded to Percy Jellum, Pendleton contractor, at the city council meeting Tuesday night, contingent upon completion of the work by September 1. Jellum was the only firm to enter a bid on the work, and total of the bid was \$4490.

The council passed an ordinance bearing the emergency clause to amend ordinance 326 relative to construction of sidewalks. The amendment provides that asphaltic surface may be used where trucks and vehicles cross the sidewalks. The ordinance previously specified that all sidewalks should be of concrete construction.

City Superintendent Vic Grosheens said that the cost of the project was less than he had anticipated. Among streets that will be included in the improvement project are Alken, Elder, Quaid, Shobe, Union, "A", Jones, Church, Baltimore, Center, South Court Street, Hill, Green, Birch, Sperry, South Main and East Matlock.

Chief of Police Dean Gilman was given authorization to advertise a call for bids for a new police car which is in the 1965-66 budget.

City Backs KUMA

Mayor Al Lamb conveyed a request from Radio Station KUMA, Pendleton, seeking support for its application to the Federal Communications Commission to increase power to 10,000 watts on a clear channel. Hearing on the matter is to be later this summer. The station asked for an affidavit and statement that would include facts on benefits here to support its case.

Audit Contract Approved

Contract with Allan C. Langenwalter, Hermiston, as auditor for the city was approved. It calls for payment of \$75 per day to him plus travel expenses while he is making the annual city audit.
