Flint of Beaverton, at an impressive all-white marriage ceremony Saturday morning, June 19, at St. Patrick's Catholic church, Heppner. Celebrant for the 10:00 a.m. nuptial mass was the Rev. Father Raymond H. Beard.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride appeared in a floor length gown of white Chantilly lace over satin, styled with lace overskirt over a full satin skirt. The long sleeved lace top was styled with fitted bodice, buttoned to the waist in front, with high neckline. Her waist length veil of matching lace was held in place with a fitted pillbox headpiece. She carried a nosegay of white orchids with cascade of white satin streamers, and centered with a large white orchid.

Hunters Told of Permit Closing Dates

Oregon big game hunters are reminded of the closing dates and drawings for big game tags and permits. Applications must be filed prior to the closing dates if hunters wish to be eligible for the drawings. Big game regulations listing all seasons and other information pertaining to the fall hunts will be available to sportsmen at license agencies about mid-July.

Antelope hunters have until 5 p.m., July 20, to file applications for the antelope season scheduled for August 14 through 18. The drawing is scheduled for 10 a.m., July 28.

Applicants for antelope tags are requested to file on the regular controlled hunt form available at license agencies. A fee of \$5.00 must be submitted with the application. Party applications are limited to two persons. Persons who received an antelope tag in 1962, 1963, or 1964 are not eligible to apply. A total of 675 tags will be issued in 6 antelope hunting areas.

Deer hunters filing applica-

tions for unit permits and controlled deer hunts have until 5 p.m., August 3, to apply, with the drawing scheduled for 10 a.m., August 11. Hunters filing for controlled hunts must do so on the regular controlled hunt application available at license agencies. A fee of \$5.00 must be submitted by each applicant. Up to four persons may apply as a party on one application. Individuals may apply for one controlled season tag.

Hunters applying for unit deer permits must file on the deer permit application form issued with the deer tag. Persons wishing to file as a party of not to exceed four persons must check the box marked "party," make identical choices, and mail all applications for the party in one envelope. Persons who properly apply prior to the August 3 deadline but are not successful in receiving a permit will receive a rejection notice and will have the privilege of reapplying for available permits.

Deadline for receipt of elk permit applications is 5 p.m., August 23. The public drawing is scheduled for 10 a.m., August 27. Application for an elk permit must be made on the application issued with the elk tag. Party applications are limited to two persons. Persons who received elk permits in 1962, 1963, or 1964 are not eligible to apply. Hunters who properly file prior to the August 23 deadline and are unsuccessful will receive a rejection notice. They may reapply for available permits or save the notice for future preference.

Hunters are reminded that they must make a choice between hunting Rocky Mountain elk in eastern Oregon or Roosevelt elk in the Cascades and coast range. The decision must be made prior to purchasing the elk tag. Once the tag is obtained there can be no change of hunting area.

With reference to the rejection notices to unsuccessful applicants, it is the responsibility of the hunter to store these away in a safe place if he expects to receive priority at a la-

ter date. As previously reported, the game commission will drop its five-year waiting period and replace it with the preference policy as recommended by the 1965 legislature.

Under the new policy, rejection notices will be sent to all applicants unsuccessful in drawings for big game tags or permits. Persons submitting five consecutive rejection notices for a species will be given preference in the issuance of tags and permits after 1969.

Blue Mountain Community College, Pendleton, is offering a 12-month nursing educational program designed to prepare qualified persons for careers in practical nursing. The course consists of such subjects as body structure and functions, medical surgical nursing, nutrition and maternal and child health. To qualify for this course, an applicant must be 17 years of age, a high school graduate or possess a certificate of high school equivalency, and be in good physical and emotional health. Classes will start September 27, 1965.

57% of Students In County Have Jobs for Summer

Fifty-seven percent of the high school students in Morrow county have summer jobs lined up, a survey taken by Lowell Chally of the County Welfare office in cooperation with Dave Potter, superintendent of schools, indicates.

Of 264 students surveyed prior to the close of school in Heppner, Ione and Riverside High schools, a total 149 said they had jobs for the summer. Of the 185 contacted at Heppner High, 118 said they had work; of 33 at Ione, 22 said they had work; and of 44 at Riverside, only nine said they had work.

An identical number at Heppner High—118—said they had work last summer. Twenty at Ione worked last summer and 28 at Riverside were employed in

the summer. Most popular types of work in order were: 1. farm, 2. clerical, 3. babysitting.

Of the 118 in Heppner who have employment, 60 live in town while 58 live in the country; at Ione, three live in town and 19 live in the country; and at Riverside, five are in town while four are in the country.

Of Heppner students surveyed, 88, including 38 seniors, said they planned to further their education by going to college and 52 said they planned to take vocational training. In the latter group were only three seniors.

Of the 185 students surveyed at Heppner, 101 were boys and 84 were girls; at Ione, 23 boys and 12 girls; at Riverside, 30 boys and 24 girls.
