THIRTY YEARS AGO July 11, 1925

Each dance ticket will be good for 100 votes, cast in the ballot box for the voter's choice for queen. Candidates from the four granges are Miss Aileen Farley, Willows grange; Miss Irene Kenny, Lexington grange; Miss Maxine McCurdy, Rhea Creek grange, and Miss Camille Stanley, Lena grange.

Buddy Blakely, son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Blakely, was an innocent victim of fireworks at Umatilla. A bomb which someone threw into the crowd where he was standing, exploded in his face, badly burning one cheek.

The Lions club quartet, F. W. Turner, Dr. R. C. Lawrence, Joseph Belanger and Blaine E. Isom, sang on the morning program of the lone community Fourth of July celebration.

First ground was broken last week in construction of Heppner's CCC Soil Conservation camp which will house company 4255. Personnel will include mostly New York boys, with about 200 coming to make their home here. Construction is on city ground adjacent to the Rodeo grounds, with L. D. Bailey as chief carpenter.

TWENTY YEARS AGO July 12, 1945

TEN YEARS AGO July 7, 1955

Negotiations began this week to request \$37,000 in state emergency funds to control grasshoppers which have been termed severe in county areas inspected by Bureau of Entomology personnel.
