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Yacht Club Skiers Capture Awards In July 4 Event

McNary Yacht club skiers who participated in the water ski tournament at Soap Lake, Wn., over the July 4 week-end, including two from Ione, did very well in the meet.

Tom Heimbigner won the big event, the men's jump, with jumps of 115 feet and 118 feet, and Mark Halvorsen won second in boys' tricks and boys' jump. Jeri Jeppe of Hermiston won third in slalom competition.

Severely handicapped by a jump surface much stickier than the well-cared for jump at their own club, Mark and Jeri took hard and long falls on their first jumps. Mark hung up on the jump, and when he finally landed on the water about 100 feet out, he hit his skis and cut a gash in his forehead which later required five stitches to close.

He came back after a 3-minute rest period and made two fine jumps to place second in the event. The next day he won second place in boys' tricks.

Jeri also hung up on the sticky ramp and took a bad fall on her first jump, but she came back to jump twice as far as her nearest competitor. However, she was unable to adjust to the surface and failed to ski away on two of her jumps. Therefore she failed to win a trophy in the girls' event. She took the third in the slalom competition which was won by a California girl.

Heimbigner had fallen on the jump in his trick runs, but in the men's jump competition he used an innovation on his jump skis that apparently minimized the stickiness of the jump and sailed well past any of his competitors, winning by a total distance of 17 feet more than anyone else with his jumps of 115 feet and 118 feet. He had applied formica bottoms to his skis. Coach Ray Heimbigner now insists that all his top jumpers apply formica to their skis. Tom's formica came unglued on one of his skis on his longest jump, causing him to lose a ski and continue on just one ski, indicating that all problems

Funeral services were Tuesday, July 6, at 10 a.m. in the Lexington Christian church with the Rev. Al Boesche officiating. Interment was in the Lexington cemetery. Sweeney Mortuary of Heppner had charge of arrangements.

He was born January 1, 1897, on Butter Creek, the son of pioneer homesteaders, Isaac and Rose Etta VanWinkle. As a boy of 10, he went through the Heppner flood in 1903.

He was married April 26, 1914, in Lexington to Cleo Eskelson who survives. Mr. VanWinkle had engaged in wheat ranching until his retirement.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Cleo VanWinkle; three sons, Alfred VanWinkle of Spokane, Jack VanWinkle of Heppner, and William VanWinkle of Lexington; three daughters, Mrs. Herman (Alma) Green and Mrs. John (Lorine) Ledbetter, both of Heppner, and Mrs. June Duvall of St. Louis, Mo.; a sister, Mrs. Ines Beattie of Philomath; and 25 grandchildren.

Planning Board Extension Sought

Morrow county court Wednesday passed a resolution authorizing extension of the Morrow county planning and zoning commission and seeking matching funds from the Urban Planning program.

The county provides \$1000 per year for the commission and \$2000 is provided by the Federal government.

Judge Paul Jones said that the court is interested in having the commission do more planning for water development, and particularly for reservoirs for recreation.

In this connection the county took action to authorize use of equipment for construction of a pond at Anson Wright Memorial park at the confluence of Chapin and Rock creeks. The Soil Conservation Service will assist with a survey and engineering the project and the county parks commission will supervise the work. It is expected that the work will be done in late August, Judge Jones said.
