

Council Approves Detour Contract For Highway 30

BOARDMAN—At the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday night of last week the contract for the detour east of the city was approved which puts traffic off highway 30, allowing the contractor to continue the building of the railroad overpass, which extends over the present highway.

The interim water system in the new city has been installed, and water is available to all lots in the town. The regular system will be completed some time this fall. The contract will be awarded in September at the same time as those for the city hall, city park and tree planting.

In other action Ralph Skoubo was appointed building inspector as provided by the building code ordinance.

Mayor Dewey West was advised to have the city dump filled in, and authorized to contact an exterminator to take care of the rat situation.

A meeting of the Boardman Fire Department was set for July 8 to set up new procedures for the department to operate.

Street Paving Begins

The Boardman City Council and the City Planning Commission held an all day joint meeting Wednesday of last week with Bill Johnson of Seattle, Wash., project engineer for the new townsite of Boardman, and Burt Anderson, resident engineer of the townsite. Plans for the new city hall were reviewed, and the townsite was visited. John M. Kelch of Pasco, Wash., contractor for utilities, is ahead of schedule with his work, and Dick Mann of Redmond, contractor for the sewage treatment plant, is on schedule. Paving of the streets will start about July 13, and be finished about Aug. 1.

In other business the development of the city park, designs and schedules were discussed.

Pettyjohns Enjoy Trailer Trip South

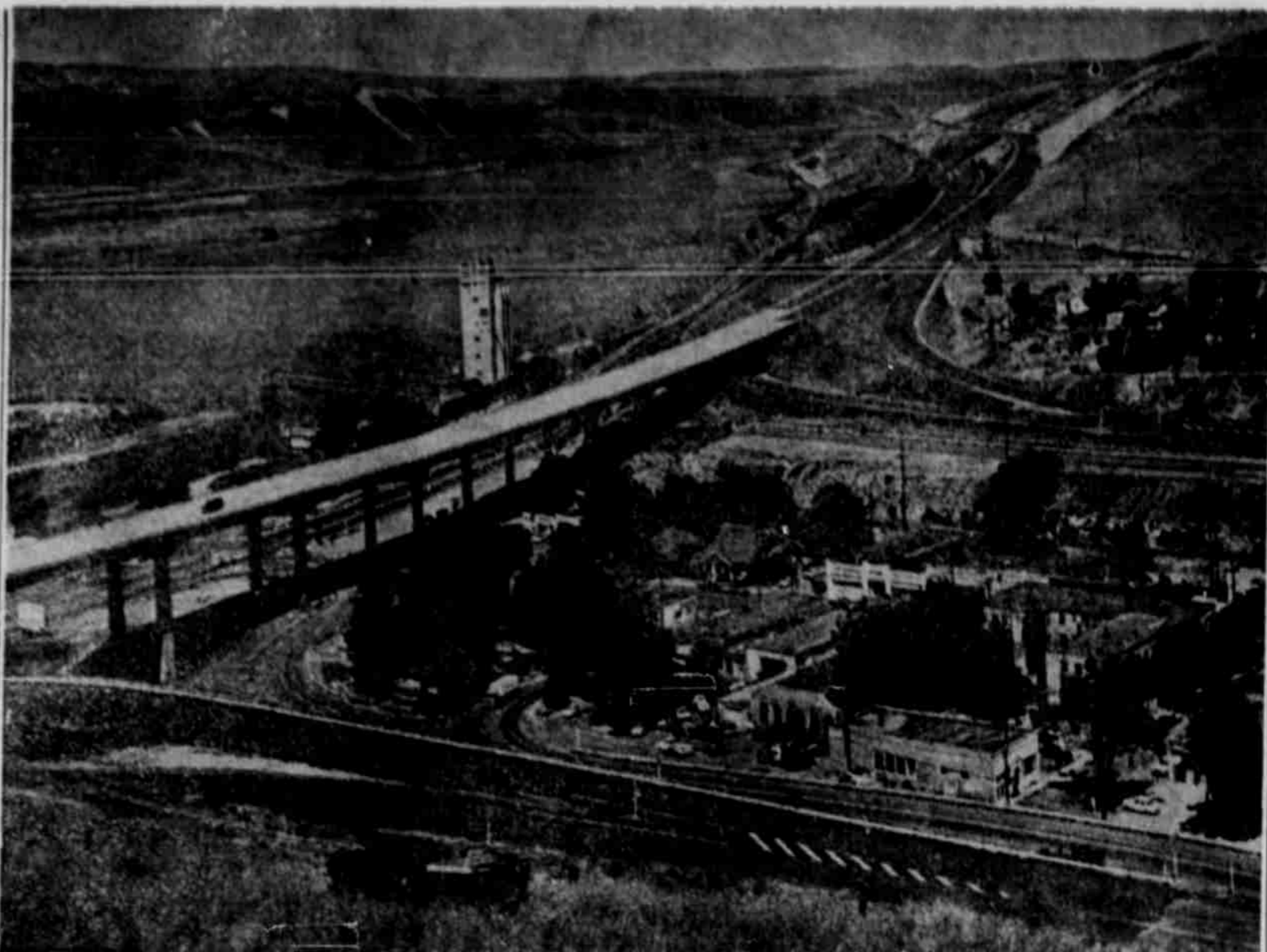
