THIRTY YEARS AGO

July 18, 1935
Fourteen prominent taxpayers signed a statement to the war department that they would work for the establishment of a flood control district which would provide rights-of-way for the construction of two dams on Willow and Rhea creeks, take care of maintenance, and otherwise hold the government harmless from damages in case the government sees fit to construct the dams. Necessity for organization of a flood control district to take care of the local angle of the dam construction was pointed out by Engineer Darr, recommending type and location of dams at an estimated cost of \$300,000.

Ed Gonty and Jim Archer returned home Sunday from a three weeks trip into Canada, going as far as Medicine Hat, Saskatchewan, the home of Mr. Archer's niece.

Harvest has been under way in the north end of the county for two weeks, and many to the south are now starting. A temperature peak of 103 Saturday and Sunday did not approach the 25-year record of 108 reached in 1928. Crops, generally, are turning out to be of high quality.

TWENTY YEARS AGO

July 18, 1945
Heppner's newest business enterprise, the Heppner Hardware and Electric store, will open its doors to the public Monday, July 23, according to announcement by the proprietors, Harold Hill and Loyal R. Parker. Complete stocking of the store will not be accomplished at once, due to war restrictions, but there will be an ample stock in most lines to take care of the local trade.

Addition of a carnival to the list of attractions for the 1945 Heppner rodeo was announced this week by Frank W. Turner, secretary. Work of preparing for the annual western exhibition, discontinued the past three years on account of the war, is going ahead.

Bishop William P. Remington returned to Heppner to officiate at two memorial services the past week-end, for Mrs. Harriet Mahoney and for Mrs. Mary Thomson.

July 14, 1955
First of a series of princess dances for the fair and rodeo court will be Saturday night for Princess Marilyn Munkers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Munkers of Lexington.

Over \$250 was realized for the chamber of commerce field lighting fund as a result of the outdoor boxing-wrestling program Saturday night at the field. A crowd of over 500 persons watched the card events.

Dale Brown of Heppner earlier this month shot his way into the championship at the Oregon state ATA trapshooting tournament in Salem, breaking 100 birds straight, then repeating in the finals to break 50 straight.

Lexington recently received delivery of a 500 gallon-per-minute fire pumper and it is now placed in service to protect the town, replacing an old truck which served only as a hose truck.

FROM THE PASTOR'S STUDY

I have been here in Heppner only a few short weeks. I have been welcomed and treated as if I had lived here all my life by the wonderful people of Heppner. Everywhere I have been folks have said, "Tell us something about the Church of the Nazarene." This I will try to do. The Church of the Nazarene, in fifty-seven years as a denomination, has become the largest for scriptural Holiness in the Wesleyan tradition. World membership now exceeds 415,500 of this total at the close of 1964, domestic membership was 349,270 and membership in 46 countries overseas was more than 66,000.

The Nazarene denomination, which maintains international offices at Kansas City, Mo., has more than doubled its membership in 20 years. The Church of the Nazarene is unusual in modern religion history. It is not a split off from another church, rather it is a merging of several independent holiness groups and reaching new converts with the gospel of full salvation. More than ten smaller denominations have joined with the Nazarenes since the church started in 1908.

Strongly evangelistic, Nazarenes believe in a heart-felt Christianity, a salvation to be personally experienced, preaching of the Bible is central in worship and the Holy Spirit is honored. The denomination maintains about 600 full time doctors, nurses, teachers, missionaries and builders in 46 countries.

The church also maintains six liberal arts Colleges in the United States and other colleges in Canada and Great Britain. A Theological Seminary and Publishing House also are located in Kansas City, Mo.

U. S. Timber Sale Contract Explained

The new U. S. Forest Service timber sale contract, which governs sale of government-owned timber to industry, was introduced and explained to 35 local lumbermen at Pendleton during the evening of July 12.

Training session on the new contract, which was updated for the first time since the early 1950's and went into effect July 1, was sponsored by the Oregon Forest Practice committee, a division of Western Wood Products association, Portland. In charge of the meeting was Herbert B. Smith of Georgia-Pacific who represented the state committee chairman, Glenn Parsons.

Participating in the session, and in a question and answer period, was Fred Matzner, WWPA district forester, and Gordon George, timber staffman on the Umatilla National Forest, who represented the USFS. Local men attending included Allen R. Nistad, Milo Prindle, Oris Crisp and Richard Graham, representing Kinzua Corporation; and J. B. Malcom and L. A. Adams of Heppner Lumber Co.
