Pacific Gas Co. Hearing Set; Ione Plant Included

The Federal Power Commission has set for September 15 in Washington, D. C., a hearing on Pacific Gas Transmission Company's proposal to step up deliveries through the Alberta-California natural gas pipeline. PGT plans to spend \$13,857,000 on the expansion.

The pipeline company asked the FPC to certify construction of new compressor stations in Spokane county, Wash., and in Morrow, Jefferson and Klamath counties in Oregon. PGT's existing compressor station near Sandpoint, Idaho, will be enlarged. No new pipe will be installed.

Plans Include a Compressor Station at Ione

The FPC also will hear PGT's request for a license to import an additional 200 million cubic feet a day from gas fields in Alberta, Canada.

The gas is for delivery to Pacific Gas and Electric Company,

the distributor serving northern California. Half of the additional volume will begin late in 1966, the remainder one year later. Addition of 52,000 horsepower in compressor (booster) units will raise PGT's deliveries through the 36-inch-diameter pipeline to about 600 million cubic feet a day at the Oregon-California border. PGT also transports up to 150 million cubic feet a day for El Paso Natural Gas Company to Northwest cities and towns.
