Family Package For Round-Up Set

The family plan package entertainment for the opening day of the Pendleton Round-Up, Wednesday, September 15, is one of the best bargains of the four-day show, according to Ford Robertson of Pendleton, Round-Up president.

The package plan includes all Round-Up and Happy Canyon events for the Wednesday show for any couple and their children, all for the price of \$12.50. This provides tickets to the afternoon Round-Up which opens at 1:15 p.m.; tickets to the beef barbecue in the Round-Up arena where special entertainment is also provided immediately following the afternoon Round-Up; and tickets to the Happy Canyon night Indian pageant, which starts nightly at 7:45 p.m.

Robertson said tickets may be purchased at the Round-Up office 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. weekdays and that a cut-off date of September 11 has been set for purchase of the package plan. All seats are reserved in the package plan.

Entertainment in the Round-Up arena during the beef barbecue includes free pony rides for the children and a display of the Clydesdale horses being brought here from St. Louis, Mo. Range style baked beans, salad, coffee, milk, and the big beef barbecue will be served immediately following the wild horse race, the last event in the Round-Up's afternoon show.

A barbecue special for those who do not wish to participate in the package plan includes kids for 75 cents and adults for \$1.25. The Round-Up and barbecue special can be obtained for \$8.75 for any couple and their children. This excludes tickets to the Happy Canyon night pageant.

Veterans' Home Loan Program Gets Increase

The maximum home loan under the Oregon veterans' farm and home loan program goes up from \$15,000 to \$16,500 starting August 13, the state Department of Veterans' Affairs reported today. The increase was approved by the 1965 Legislature.

H. C. Saalfeld, veterans' affairs director, said no change was made by the Legislature in the farm loan maximum of \$40,000 nor in the maximum home loan repayment period of 25 years. Both home and farm loans are still limited to 85 percent of the appraised value.

He said that although the home loan increase hasn't taken effect yet, the veterans' department has been accepting applications for the new higher amount and processing them through commitment and up to the final closing stage, so they can be closed immediately starting August 13.

Through July 28, the department had received 143 applications for loans under the new amendment in the amount of \$1,892,450, and had issued 78 commitments for \$1,054,000.
