Boeing Begins Engine Firings

The first in a series of space-propulsion system tests was conducted last Thursday at the Boeing Company's Boardman test site, the company announced. An RL-10 engine was fired, using a combination of liquid-oxygen and liquid-hydrogen fuels. The test lasted for approximately four seconds as planned.

Additional test-firings of longer duration are scheduled approximately one each week.

Commission Calls For Rest Area Bids

Among bids to be received by the Oregon State Highway Commission at its August 31 meeting in Salem will be those for construction of a rest area near Boardman on Highway 80N.

The complete rest area will be located about 22 miles east of Arlington and 2.5 miles west of Boardman. Plans call for construction of picnic shelters and tables. Lawn, trees and shrubs will be planted. Completion date is set for May 31, 1966.

The commission will receive bids on a total of 14 projects at the meeting with estimated total cost of \$1,500,000.
