Plans were made to have another reunion in two years, to be held August 13, 1967.

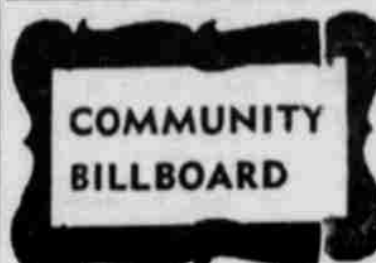
