

Directors Act on Matters At August School Meet

(Editor's note: The following story is conclusion of the report on the August school board meeting. Lack of space did not permit running the entire story last week.)

Charles Moorman was offered a contract as band instructor at Boardman and Irrigon by the board of directors of Morrow County School District R-4 at its August meeting in the Lexington administrative building. He will work in both grade and high schools. Moorman has had extensive experience in the field, Supt. David Potter said. The contract will be for 9½ months.

The board confirmed the appointment of Mrs. Jerry Daggett as Heppner High school secretary, and adjusted the contract of Dale Holland who has been assigned to be head baseball coach at Heppner High school in addition to working as driver training instructor.

A schedule of district school board meetings through June, 1966, was approved by the board. It lists regular meetings as well as special meetings on specific matters of significance to the district. At least one meeting is planned for each area of the county.

Committee Work Advised

Supt. Potter stressed the need for community committees to study particular matters of importance in correlation with advisory committees, such as interpreting modern math to patrons, consideration of the physical education program, and studying buildings and grounds. These committees would report to the school board, probably at the March and April meetings.

The board agreed, and Chairman Irvin Rauch named a committee to determine areas that need such a citizens' study. On the committee are Supt. Potter, Director Don McElligot of Ione, Clarence Baker of Heppner and William Parker of Irrigon.

Directors authorized payroll deductions of those employed by the district who wish to sign up for a state insurance plan that provides high benefits at low

premium rates. The plan is one that includes all state and county employees, and recently was expanded to include school districts.

Considerable discussion centered on the matter of whether school buses should go on to private roads as sometimes requested by patrons in order that students need not walk so far to meet the buses. Although there was considerable inclination to form a policy not to permit this, it was decided that each case would be considered on an individual basis.

Supt. Potter said that he had been paid a visit by a representative of the State Liquor Commission relative to the district's feelings about a tavern that would be located across the street from one corner of the Riverside High school grounds at Boardman.

State Fair Seeks Old Collections

There is no limitation on classification by craft or hobby. Wood carvings, ceramics, wood inlay, mosaics are just a few of the creative craft exhibits suggested by Fitzsimons.

Entry applications are being accepted now, Fitzsimons said. The actual entries will be received in the Crafts and Hobbies Department at the Fair, Saturday and Sunday, August 21 and 22, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Friday and Saturday, August 27 and 28 from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

All entries must be in place and on display by midnight, August 28.
