Good participation in Morrow County Fair last week earned the privilege of entry in State Fair for several 4-H home economics members. While the overlapping of the two fairs this year has made it difficult for some of them to attend State Fair, most of them will be present for the events in Salem.

Top winner in the senior division of 4-H clothing dress revue is Carol Rawlins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Rawlins, Ione. Livestock Sold at Fair Auction

Prize winning livestock of 4-H and FFA was sold at the annual auction Thursday night, August 26, at the Morrow county fair with both numbers and prices up from last year's sale.

A total of 43 lambs and sheep, 13 hogs, and 19 beef were sold. Central Market paid 53c per pound for Steve Wagenblast's grand champion FFA Hereford, a total of \$477 for the 900-lb. animal. Morrow County Grain Growers bought the grand champion 4-H Hereford from Herbert Ekstrom, III, for 47c per pound of \$484.10 total for the 1030 pound beef.

Both 4-H and FFA reserve champions brought 50c per pound. John Wagenblast's 965-lb. FFA reserve grand champion Hereford went to Tennessee Engineering Corp., The Dalles, for \$482.50, and Central Market bought Eric Anderson's 4-H reserve grand champion at a total price of \$442.50.

Sue Greenup's prime Southdown grand champion 4-H lamb commanded a price of 75c per pound, \$79.50, from the buyer, Northwestern Livestock Commission Co., Hermiston. Grand champion FFA Southdown lamb, owned by Earl Struckmeier, brought 44c and was sold to Inland Chemical for \$37.84. Reserve grand champion, 4-H, another prime Southdown, was sold by Nancy Doherty to Central Market at 35c per pound, or \$32.55.

Steve Pettyjohn's grand champion 4-H Hampshire hog also was purchased by Central Market at 36c per pound, or \$77.76. Reserve grand champion, another Hampshire, was sold by Steve's brother, Larry Pettyjohn, to Colleen Greenup, also for 36c or \$64.80. The price for the grand champion in this case was down somewhat from last year when the 4-H grand champion brought 40c.
