THIRTY YEARS AGO
August 15, 1935

The wool and grain show will be a part of this year's 4-H Club fair to be held in conjunction with the Rodeo. In addition a woolen goods exhibit is being sponsored by the Morrow County Wool Growers auxiliary. Girls' club exhibits will be shown in the dance pavilion and in the model kitchen, erected for the use of the cooking clubs for the first time this year.

Celebration for completion of the Heppner-Spray road is set for Labor Day. Hard surfacing of the road is now complete. The forest part on Wilson point was announced as the probable site of the celebration.

Christmas bags of brightly colored chintz or cretonne are being made by the Morrow County Red Cross chapter for men of the army, navy and marine corps ill in hospitals abroad and stationed in the most remote posts. Articles for them may be turned over to Frances Case, secretary, or Josephine Mahoney chairman of the county Red Cross chapter.

August 16, 1945

Bert Mason closed his mercantile business in Ione this week, after being in continuous service to the people of the community since June, 1898—right in the middle of the Spanish-American war. It was established by Mat Halvorsen in 1894, employed Mason at a monthly salary of \$35. He borrowed money for 1/3 interest in the business in 1898, and the rest in 1912.

Consolidation of three more school districts has been effected recently, states Mrs. Lucy Rodgers, county superintendent. School Dist. No. 52, Social Ridge, has been consolidated with Dist. 12, and Strawberry and Hodson are joined with No. 23, Devine Dist.

With the second world war now history, grain growers are
