Big Water Ski Meet Set At McNary Labor Day

McNary Yacht club show troupe is staging its annual water ski show at Hat Rock State Park this Sunday and Monday, September 5 and 6, at 2 p.m., and invite their many friends in Morrow county to attend.

There will be no admission charge, as the purpose of this show is to provide a community celebration on Labor Day week-end, also to promote water skiing and show what local youth can do when given the proper opportunity, inspiration and training.

Tom Heimbigner, Mark, Joe, and Frank Halvorsen, all ranked as top show skiers in the nation, will perform some especially difficult and dangerous stunts, many of which are new even to this great show.

Other good skiers from this area who will appear are Susan Lindstrom, Cheryl Lundell, Bonnie Hynd, Margia Baker, LeRoy Rea, Dot Halvorsen and Ray Heimbigner, director and producer of the show.

Riding the newest thing in water skiing will be Frank Halvorsen and Tom Heimbigner, who will attempt crossovers while riding hydrofoils. Joe Halvorsen and Susan Lindstrom will do a stunt now being done at the World's Fair by the Tommy Bartlett show skiers, when they go over the jumping ramp while riding the same pair of skis. To outdo the World's Fair group, Mark will do the same thing with Randy Watt as his partner at the same time as the other couple. This will really crowd the ramp, but these skiers like it that way.

Attempting a stunt never before done and invented by this group will be Tom, Mark, and Joe, along with Bill Jeppe, Kathy Watt, and Jeri Jeppe, when they will try to put two pyramids over the jump at the same time. This is the act which has been selected as the insignia of this group of show skiers, whose many innovations have become known throughout the nation.

Other acts will be the parake, two kites behind one boat doing crossovers, canoe paddle pyramid, one foot barefoot, helicopters over and under, long distance jumping by Mark who came within four feet of the national record in the tournament at Tri-Cities last week. Also, an almost impossible double turn on the jumping ramp by Tom Heimbigner who puts his twisting background in gymnastics to good use. Chuck Hammond will carry his son on his back while skiing barefoot.

Souvenir programs which contain pictures of many of these acts will be available at cost at the show site.

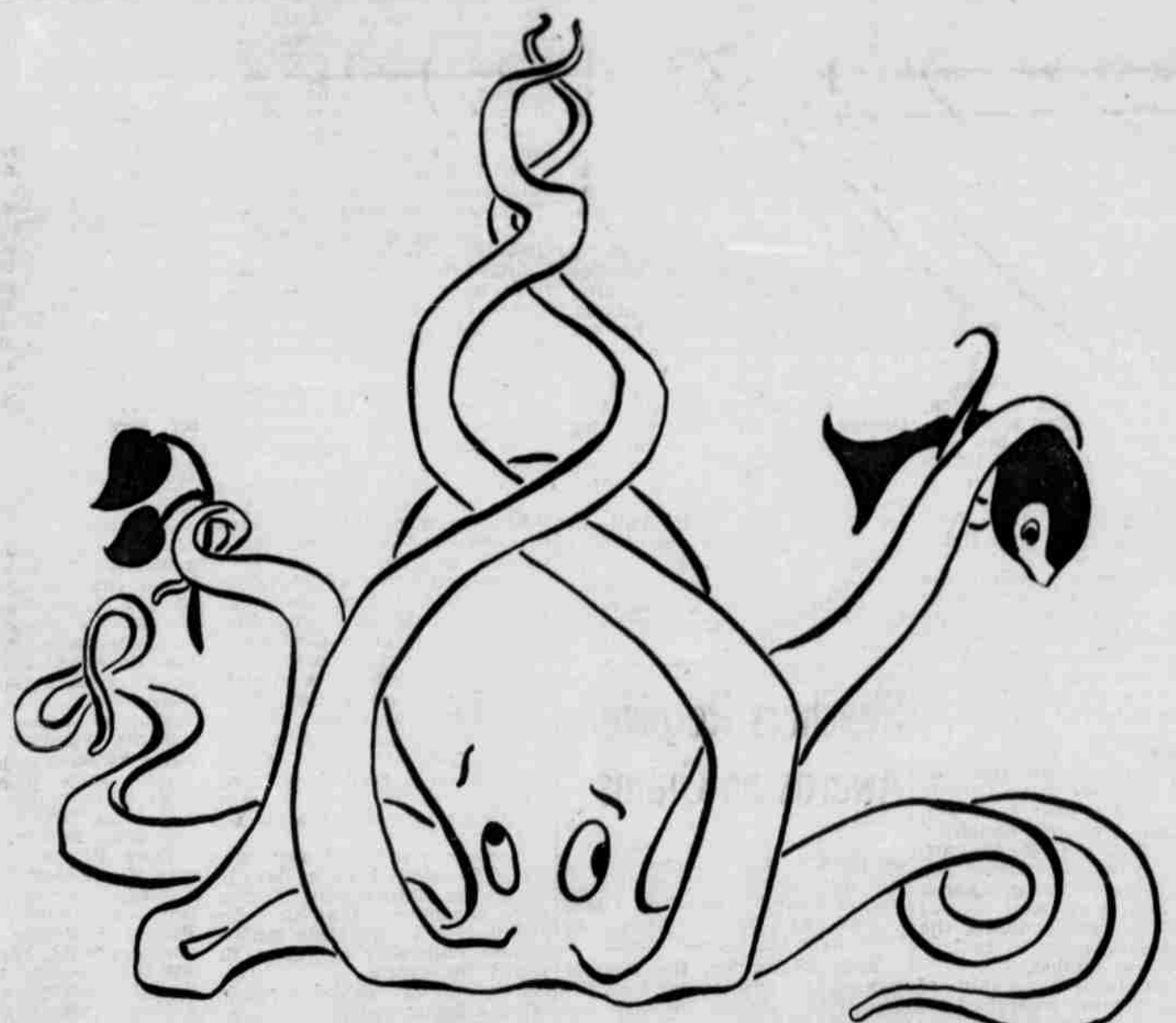
