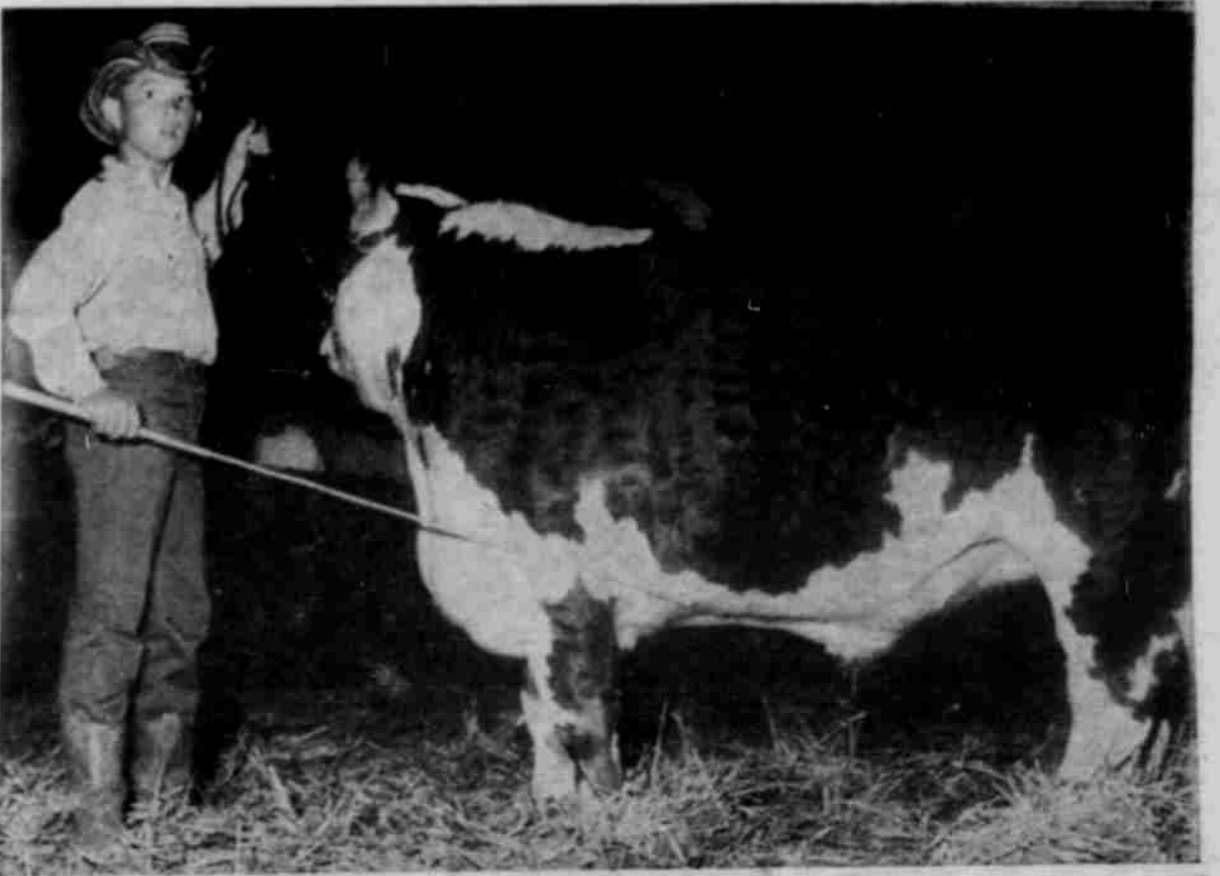
TOP LEFT
