

Floyd Jones Horse, Mr. Bar Barred, Grand Champion At County Show

Floyd Jones' golden palomino quarterhorse, Mr. Bar Barred, bears the title of grand champion performance horse in Morrow county after winning the distinction at the Morrow county horse show at the rodeo grounds Friday.

Jones thereby received the Jerry Daggett revolving trophy, which was won last year—the year of its inception, by Ival R. Sullivan, Iriton, with his horse, King's Pistol Ten.

Mr. Bar Barred, sired by Leo Bar and May Bar was the dam.

Reserve champion at the show was Jet's Babe Bar, the black quarterhorse of Mrs. Bill (Kite) Healy. The reserve champion was also sired by Leo Bar with Healy's Jet as the dam.

The Maestro, owned by the Beamer ranch and ridden by Neil Beamer, won first in cow cutting and received a \$100 prize from the First National Bank as a trophy. The Maestro was sired by Music Mount out of Lowry Girl. Mr. Bar Barred, ridden by Owner Floyd Jones was second in cow cutting, and a \$5 halter from the first National Bank was the trophy. Third in cutting was Teddy's Salute, ridden by Virgil Chapman of Boardman, and fourth was Becky Bar, owned and ridden by Howard Bryant.

Sandra Eubanks rode her horse, Skeet Bar, to first place in barrel racing in a time of 20.6 and won a \$100 prize given by Fred Mankin. Second went to Pat Dougherty riding her horse, Be Bop, and she received a \$5 saddle blanket as a trophy, also given by Mankin. Third was won by Ruby Fullerton on her horse, Boy Doll; and fourth was a tie between Erna Winchester riding her horse, Polly, and Shannon Mahoney riding her Chippaway Princess.

Camille Malcolm riding her Lady Bird won the trail class for children through 14 years of age in a time of 30.1, thereby receiving a \$10 gift certificate from Elma's Apparel as a trophy. Second, which brought a \$5 certificate from Elma's, went to Becky Fullerton on her Suds. In third place was Marcia Jones on Tico Chex, and fourth was Sherri O'Brien on Princess.

A good-sized crowd was present on the crisp day to view the pick of Morrow county's horses, and about 225 of the best were there to perform. Ken Waud, judge, of Othello, Wn., commented on the difficulty of choosing the winners from among the fine stock.

Football fans who want to get a peek at what to expect of the Mustang gridders for the coming season are invited to watch them in an intrasquad contest on Wednesday night, September 8, at the rodeo grounds.

The game will be two days before the season's opener with Pilot Rock here Friday night, September 10.

Last week, the Mustangs have been working out regularly. The coach finds that he has some real good gridders on hand, but the veterans are few in number. Of the total, only some 16 are juniors and seniors and the rest are underclassmen.

From nine lettermen, Coach Potter can come close to fielding an all-veteran outfit, but not quite.

All but two of the lettermen are seniors. Jim Doherty, a junior, will probably hold down the quarterback spot or share it with Gene Heliker, senior, who currently is out of the running because of a fractured collarbone suffered prior to opening of practice.

Jim Jacobs, the other junior letterman, will probably run at the fullback spot.

Senior lettermen are headed by Tim Driscoll, backfield stand-out last season, Mark Murray and Mickey Massey, the two "double M's," will be back at the tackle positions, while Mark Brown and Tim Tullis, two more senior veterans, will be at the end spots. David Clark will be center.

Two more seniors who are non-lettermen undoubtedly will fill roles in the backfield, David Gray and Ken Morgan. In the line loom two more good seniors in Winter and Ray Jones. Stanley Rauch, junior, is another good guard prospect.

From the ranks of the sophomores come two boys who show good varsity potential, David Hall, a quarterback, and Russell Kilkenny. The latter, in fact, is the biggest man on the squad, and he will probably find plenty of action in the line.

Practices are now being held in the evening only, starting at 6 p.m. Working with Coach Potter is Bob Clough, as football assistant, and Joe Hausler, jay-vee coach.

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Belated Harvest Underway Again

With clearing weather, belated harvest got underway again this week, and ranchers are hoping that no more rain will come until they get the job done.

Al Lamb, manager of Morrow County Grain Growers, estimated Monday that 300,000 bushels of grain were still in the field. This would represent something like 15% of the total crop.

Quality has suffered somewhat by the rains, he said. However, he said that he did not know of any cases where wheat had started to sprout in the heads.

Some ranchers in the southern part of the county had not been able to get at their harvest at all through last week's rain, and grain was coming in this week as far north as the Lexington elevator.
