

Blue Ribbon Winners Named In 4-H Home Ec

The quality of exhibits and participation by 4-H home economics members in this year's County Fair has been very good. In recognition of their achievements a list of blue ribbon winners is given below.

Yet the reader is cautioned against assuming only blue ribbon winners benefit from 4-H. Fair exhibits and contests are combined with many factors such as club participation, tours, recreation, community service projects, project talks, special project work and demonstrations to form responsible citizens—a focal point of the 4-H program.

Champion Cowboy Enters Exposition

Dean Oliver, the Boise, Idaho rancher who is also the world's champion cowboy, has two reasons to come to the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in North Portland Oct. 9-17.

A cattle rancher himself, Oliver likes a good look at the cattle exhibited at the P-I, the Northwest's largest and one of the nation's top livestock shows.

And he comes to compete in the rodeo events of the 12 arena performances staged during the P-I. This year Oliver will be trying for his third consecutive ranking as the P-I's all-around cowboy as well as to gather more money points en route to his third national title.

Ranked by the Rodeo Cowboys Association as among the nation's top rodeos, the P-I regularly draws leading money winners from the touring cowboys. Among the big money winners who competed last year and are expected to return are Bon Wegner, who earned \$20,757 to gain the bull riding world's championship; Mark Schricker from Sutherlin, Ore., whose \$23,323 made him fourth in overall winnings last year; and Kenny Stanton of Weiser, Idaho, who in four years rodeoing earned his height in thousands of dollars (Kenny stands 5' 5" and earned \$55,000 in 1961 through 1964.)

At the P-I rodeo events are interspersed with the spit and polish performance classes of the P-I horse show, approved as a Class A horse show by the American Horse Shows Association. The 55 year old horse show attracts top horses and riders from all over the west. This year the show will again include quarter horse performance events.

His wife preceded him in death on November 11, 1946. He had worked for Kinzua Fine Mills from June, 1927, until forced to retire because of a heart attack.

He is survived by his three children, six grandchildren and one great grandchild. Mel was a great lover of children and will be long remembered for the many kindnesses he did for them.

Medicare Signup Starts in County

The enrollment of the 474 old-age beneficiaries in Morrow county for Medical Insurance "Medicare" started this week, according to Vernon A. Welo, district manager of the La Grande Social Security office.

The first of 144 million enrollment cards were mailed from Baltimore Wednesday and weekly mailings will be made through November 5. All beneficiaries on the rolls prior to September 1, will receive one of

these cards in the mail and they are requested not to contact the Social Security office until after November 5, unless they need assistance in completing the card, Welo stated.

Everyone who is within three months of age 65, or older and has never filed for benefits should file a claim for health insurance during this initial enrollment period which ends on March 31, 1966. This applies to anyone who has never worked under Social Security as well as those still working full-time. A special meeting, including night hours, will be held in the near future in Heppner to sign up this group. The exact dates will be announced shortly.

Welo emphasized that the Medicare Program does not go into effect until July 1, 1966, and one should contact his own insurance agent before changing his present insurance policies.

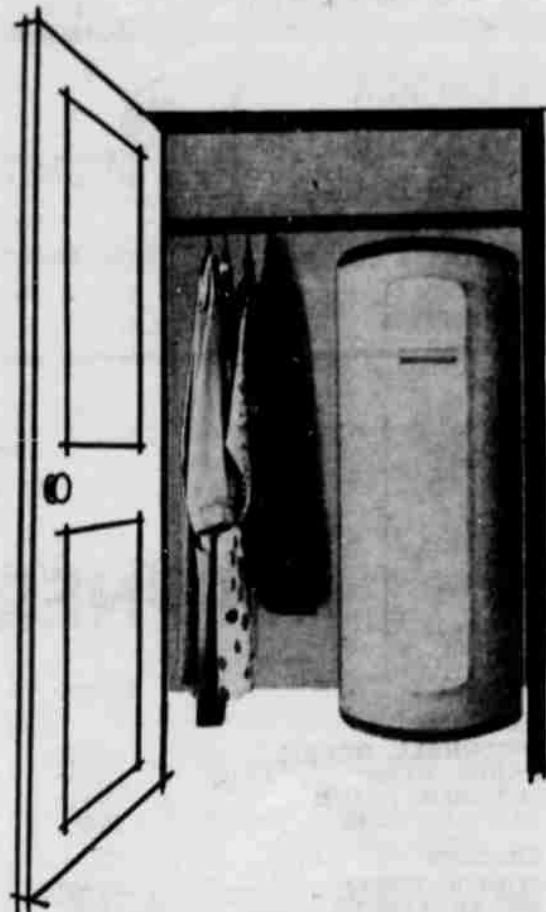
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
