the left of the concrete island or around it to the right, he said.

"I'm not sure that I know which is right either," he said. The chief said that he thought the crosswalk sign would do some good, but added, "I don't know how much good." The light won't completely eliminate the problem.

"I'm surprised there hasn't been a bad accident there," he said.

The matter was turned over to the street committee for investigation, but it appeared to be the consensus that the sign would be a step in the right direction.

Alley Raises Question

C. F. Hall appeared before the council to inquire about an alley that is designated between his home property and that of the Walter Edgers, running east from North Court. The two residences are just below the Nazarene church.

Hall said that there was a question in the minds of the property owners as to whether the alley is still under city ownership, whether it is the property of the adjoining owners, and what its boundaries are.

Councilmen were in doubt about the matter, although it appeared that the alley is city property. It was agreed that a survey would be needed to determine the accurate boundaries of the alley, which is not in use as a thoroughfare. A sewer line running from the hospital also is involved in the problem and Hall said that it is running across property of the home owners there.

The matter is to be referred

to City Attorney Bob Abrams for checking to determine the status of the alley.

Aasks Street Lights

Dr. Jim Norene appeared at the council on behalf of property owners living within the city limits on the Condon highway. He said that there are no street lights in the area for a distance of some 1200 feet, although six power poles are set in the same distance. He asked that lights be installed in the area, pointing out that there were often "late night visitors" in the vicinity.

The matter was turned over to the committee that covers street lights, Councilmen LeRoy Gardner, chairman, David McLeod and Clarence Rosewall.

Street Corner Eyed

A survey from Tennessee Engineering Corp., The Dalles, on the corner of Gale and May streets, which had asked for the survey at a recent meeting.

Through usage during the years, the corner has been cut by the street so that it has slipped on to private property adjoining the street. The council, recognizing hazards of a congested area there, has been interested in acquiring title to the private property on which the street now infringes.

Feeling expressed Monday night is that the council seek to buy the property together with 10 additional feet for shoulders and parking. The matter is to be referred to City Attorney Abrams for his recommendation.

Fire Truck Over Bid

Bill for the new city fire truck was presented by Western States Fire Apparatus company, and it was found to be over the bid submitted by the company by \$247.25.

It was explained that this is due to a heavier axle and different wheels that were furnished, since the lighter axle is no longer standard equipment.

The question arose as to whether the council is legally empowered to pay in excess of the accepted bid.

Again, this matter will be referred to the city attorney for his opinion. Payment of the bill was deferred until this is done.

Bridge Bid Accepted

Bid of Howard Keithley to rebuild a bridge at Cannon and Kirk streets was approved by the city. He was the only bidder on the job and set a figure of \$872.60. This was somewhat above estimates of Supt. Groshens. He said that city crews could do the work at less cost since the men are on the regular city payroll but that they would have no time prior to cold weather to do it.

Councilmen expressed the feeling that if there were liability because of the hazard, the city should proceed with the work. Groshens said that Keithley's bid was "not out of line" with contract jobs at current prices.

Petition Tabled

Petition signed by owners whose property abuts on South Court St. for paving the street at their cost was tabled by the council because it was felt too late in the year to get the work done now.

Groshens said that the petition should have been received prior to the time that street repair work was done by Percy Jellum Co. here. Signers of the petition included Levi N. Conner, Clayton Ayers, C. J. D. Bauman, Edna Hutchens, Wayne Harsin and Forrest Burkenbine.

The council tabled the petition with the suggestion that it be resubmitted at a later time.

Chief Gilman brought up the matter of dogs running at large after being asked at the previous meeting to check into the matter. He said that Attorney Abrams was looking into the matter of a leash law and had expected to report at this meeting but was unable to be present.

Topping the list is Mark Halvorsen, senior quarterback, who sustained an injury in a water ski meet over the week-end. He hurt a toe in the meet, and it may be broken, the coach said.

Monte Crum, junior halfback and another letterman, has an injured ankle, and Keith Nelson, a good freshman prospect at

end, has a hurt elbow. Seventeen are out for the team and all are lettermen except five freshmen.
