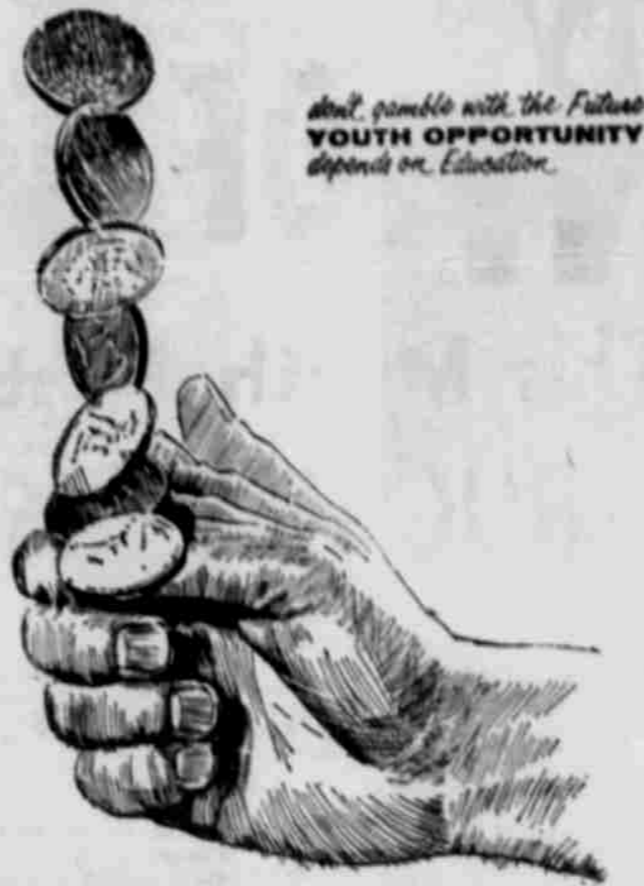
When they returned home they brought grandson Travis Blank home with them for a week. He returned home Saturday.

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### Anderson Family Arrives in Paris En Route to Niger

Mr. and Mrs. Nels Anderson arrived in Paris Thursday, September 9, according to a letter received from them Monday.

Written by Nels, the letter follows:

"Well, we are in grande Par-ee! Have a 14-hour stop-over between planes. We arrived from New York at 8:30 a.m. after a 6-hour flight from there. Nova Scotia, Isle of Jersey, England and France sure look good from the air. What we have seen of Paris looks real good, clean and green.

"We have been treated royally; met at the bus, taken to the Baltimore Hotel, served breakfast in our rooms and showed the sights of the city. We are getting many good colored slides and pictures.

"We have been delayed a week in getting to Africa. There were no reservations available before now. We were scheduled to be there the 4th. We left Heppner on the 30th, visited relatives in Seattle, St. Paul, Fargo and Lisbon, N. D., on the way through to New York.

"The boys got to meet some aunts, uncles and cousins they had not seen before, and I had the opportunity to see my four sisters and three brothers as well as my dad. We went out on the town in New York and the boys enjoyed the view from atop the Empire State Bldg., a walk down Broadway, the Grand Central Station, Central Park and a quick trip through the World's Fair.

"I spent a day in the office in New York getting better oriented for my job. I am looking forward to getting on the job. Sincerely, Nels."

The night before, son Kit wrote from New York city, showing the speed with which they are traveling. He told of walking 80 blocks in New York.

"We started out for dinner but ended up seeing the Pan Am Bldg., the UN Bldg., and David, Doug, Rick and I went up 102 stories to the top of the Empire State Bldg. Then we took a walk about 20 blocks on Broadway.

### Pacific Gas Opens Proposal Hearings

Hearings before the Federal Power Commission in Washington, D. C., opened Wednesday on Pacific Gas Transmission Company's proposal to increase deliveries through the Alberta-California natural gas pipeline which crosses Morrow county, according to information from Roger C. Thompson of Spokane, Wn., public information representative for the company.

The hearings are of particular importance to Morrow county because if a favorable decision is reached, a compressor station (Station 9) will be built at Ione at a cost of about \$2,369,000. One 10,000 horse power gas turbine-driven centrifugal compressor and auxiliary equipment are to be installed.

At the hearings PGT will request an import license and authority to invest \$13.9 million in new compressor horsepower and related construction in the Pacific Northwest.

Also included in the plans is a maintenance base tentatively scheduled for Condon to be constructed at a cost of \$215,000.
