Dufur Team Drops Cardinal Squad In First Contest

Some tough breaks in the early part of the game meant a defeat for Ione High's Cardinals against Dufur High at Dufur in the first 8-man football game of the year for the Cards Friday afternoon, 30 to 19.

Trailing by 18 points at half-time, the Ione gang surged back and threatened to overcome the big Dufur team, but couldn't quite make the grade.

In the process, they lost Mark Halvorsen, quarterback, who was taken from the game suffering with a slight concussion. He was working out in practice early this week on a limited basis only.

Early in the first half, the Cardinals missed a good chance to hit the scoreboard when they failed to tally after making a long march deep in Dufur territory. At that time the Dufur team was ahead, 12-0.

"I was proud of the way they came back in the second half," Coach Gordon Meyers said.

Bob Baker brought the first six points on a 4-yard run, and Halvorsen rambled 35 yards for another touchdown in the third quarter.

With Halvorsen sidelined because of his injury, Jay Ball stepped into the quarterback slot, pitched a pass to Leon Magill that covered 63 yards on the pass and run, and this netted a third touchdown for the Cardinals.

The coach had words of praise for the way Ball filled the key spot.

In the meantime, Dufur added two more for their 30 point total.

The Cards had another touchdown in their grasp in the third period, but a pass was intercepted right on the goal line to end the threat in frustration for the Ione team.

Two touchdowns by Dufur were called back because of backfield in motion penalties, an infraction that the home eight was making often in the ball game.

Ione is idle this week but travels to Weston Friday, September 24, for a game there.

School Officials Emphasize Need To Get Diplomas

"Return to high school—graduate." This annual plea by Oregon's school officials has added meaning with the growing practice of employers to hire only those with high school diplomas.

In Oregon's 1963 graduating class, 82.5 percent of the ninth grade enrollment obtained their diplomas, according to figures compiled by the State Department of Education. The rapid disappearance of unskilled jobs, however, means that the 17.5 percent who elected to leave school without their diplomas have virtually closed the door to their future.

Once placing themselves in the labor market, they will find it difficult to complete their education.

Oregon's high school dropout rate has been steadily decreasing, according to Glen L. Weaver, Department of Education supervisor of guidance and counseling, and statistics show that those who do drop out stay in school longer before doing so.

In 1952 the dropout rate was 36.2 percent, with 1 out of 3 ninth graders failing to complete their high school education. The rate has steadily decreased to 24.0 percent in 1961, 22.5 percent in 1962, 21.8 percent in 1963, and 19.2 percent in 1964.

"Despite the steady increase in the holding power of Oregon high schools," states Dr. Leon P. Minear, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, "there are still a substantial number of ninth graders who do not complete their senior year." He urges every adult in the state knowing a person of high school age who has not graduated to encourage that individual to return to school this fall and complete his high school education.

Log Truck Accident Takes James Jayroe
 James Jayroe of Sheridan, and formerly of Heppner, died last Wednesday, September 8, at Portland Sanitarium hospital from injuries received in a logging truck accident, according to word received here by friends.

He and his brother, Sam, were critically injured and were trapped about eight hours in the cab of their overturned log truck near Otis last Tuesday night. Both were employed by the Matt Erickson Lumber Co. of Grand Ronde.

Jayroe's survivors include a widow and small daughter.

Ullman Commended For Shoreline Work

The compromise recently effected by Congressman Al Ullman regarding shoreline use of the John Day pool won the praise of the Space Age Industrial Park Development Association today. Ted A. Smith of Pendleton, President of the SPADA group, said the board of directors had commended Congressman Ullman for engineering a compromise that returned approximately 1 1/2 miles of prime industrial lands near Boardman to future private use in exchange for waterfowl lands elsewhere on the pool.

Since early 1962, SPADA has vigorously opposed the unnecessarily large waterfowl refuge proposed near Boardman, as well as certain other aspects of the U. S. Corps of Engineer's master plan for acquisition of lands on the John Day pool.

Smith said SPADA's basis for contention that much of the land near Boardman was ideally suited for industrial and recreational use was a report of recommended land use on the entire pool prepared this year by engineering consultants.

The professional report was made possible through the joint sponsorship of Division of Planning and Development of the State Department of Commerce and the Mid-Columbia Planning Council. The office of Governor Hatfield and the staff of Planning and Development have been for months very helpful in attempting to secure relief from the demands of the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service for lands in this prime industrial area.

Smith said that SPADA had forwarded written testimony to recent hearings in Washington to support the position taken by Congressman Ullman.

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Three Sons' Visits Especially Welcome For N. D. Baileys

The Penlands published the Gazette-Times for nine years, after coming here in 1951. He served as president of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers association one year and also is a past chairman of the association's advertising managers.

Salvation Army Sets \$2000 Goal In Morrow County

Senior Major Minnie Parsons, Salvation Army service extension representative for the Oregon-Southern Idaho Division, will visit Morrow County during September. She will brief local leaders on the work of the service extension division throughout the county, and will make an effort to establish a local Salvation Army committee.

A goal of \$2,000 has been established for Morrow County for the coming year, Major Parsons said. Letters of appeal will be mailed to local citizens following her visit.

The Salvation Army through its service extension division brings some 23 different types of aid to meet needs throughout Morrow County. These include disaster and transient relief, farm fire relief, aid to unwed mothers, and emergency food, clothing and medical aid for those ineligible for government welfare.

Last year the Salvation Army's White Shield Home and Hospital in Portland provided more than 16,000 days' care to 263 unmarried mothers.

Funds raised in the county will help meet these needs, Major Parsons said. Such appeals are made only in areas where individual contributions are a major source of support; none are made in areas where the Salvation Army receives partial financial support from a United Fund.

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
