

**THIRTY YEARS AGO**

Sept. 12, 1935

The Arthur Parker home at the head of Dutton canyon on Heppner flat was completely razed by fire at an early hour September 5, and Mrs. Parker narrowly escaped while the house and all contents were a total loss.

Morrow county is receiving its first introduction to Smith-Hughes vocational agriculture, thru inauguration of the course at Boardman this year, and progress of the work will be watched with interest by other schools of the county.
