### Heppner Blanks Condon Gridders By 31-0 Score

Heppner High's Mustangs went to Condon Friday afternoon, played the Condon Blue Devils and scored their second lopsided football win, 31-0. The Mustangs had defeated Pilot Rock here in their opener the previous week, 25-7.

First half of the game was relatively slow getting underway, but in the second quarter, Heppner's Tim Driscoll ran 11 yards to score. The conversion try was not good, and the 6-0 score held until halftime.

Heppner's Ken Morgan took the show in the third quarter as he ran 54 yards on a reverse and brought a second touchdown for the Mustangs. The conversion point was good as Jim Doherty threw a pass to Mark Brown, making it 13-0.

Still more was to come in the third quarter. Morgan crossed the white line from one yard out for the Mustangs' third touchdown, and the third quarter ended 19-0 for Heppner.

During the fourth quarter, Driscoll broke loose for a 55-yard gallop after taking a pitchout from Doherty on an option play, making it 25-0 for Heppner. Also in the final period Steve Pettyjohn, a sophomore, caught a 15-yard pass from Jim Doherty in the end zone, giving Steve his first points as a member of the Heppner High varsity and making the final score 31-0.

The Condon Blue Devils never threatened during the game. Heppner had 267 yards rushing to Condon's 43 yards, and the Mustangs made 35 yards on passing as they completed four of 13. Condon made only one yard on passing although it completed both the aerials attempted. One gained two yards and the other lost one yard.

Driscoll continued to roll on his high running average, making 131 yards on 18 carries, an average of 7.2. Morgan made 100 yards on 11 carries for an 8.7 average.

Heppner's Coach Jim Potter said he was pleasantly surprised at Morgan's work as he scored two touchdowns and gained 100 yards.

Outstanding on defense were Mark Murray, who like Morgan is a senior. Murray made 13 tackles during the game. Mickey Kinde (Massey), another senior, came up with 10 tackles.

Heppner achieved the victory although the team was considerably outweighed by the Blue Devils. Coach Potter said the opposition averaged 20 or 30 pounds heavier.

### Diantha Akers Claimed by Death At Age of 93

Mrs. Diantha Akers, 93, who first came to Morrow county in 1913, died in Pioneer Memorial hospital, Heppner, Sunday.

Funeral services were Wednesday, September 22, at 2 p.m. in the United Church of Christ, Ione, with the Rev. Walter Crowell officiating and Mrs. Katherine Lindstrom, acting worthy matron of Locust chapter No. 119, Order of Eastern Star, assisting.

Mrs. Akers was born March 15, 1872, in Milford, Neb. She and her husband engaged in wheat ranching after coming to the county in 1913. They remained until 1922 when they moved to Portland, and she was a resident there until 1952 when she returned to Ione to make her home since that time.

Her husband, B. F. Akers, preceded her in death in 1937.

Mrs. Akers was a member of the Order of Eastern Star for 54 years and belonged to the Rose Croix chapter, Portland. She was also a member of the Methodist church in Portland.

For many years she was active in the American Red Cross and during World War II won a presidential citation for her work in this organization.

Surviving are a daughter, Mary Lindsay of Ione; a son, John W. Bacon Tekoa, Wn.; four stepdaughters, Mrs. Ernest Yeska, Portland, Mrs. Bob Olson, Seattle, Wn., Mrs. Bertha Robinson, Austin, Texas, and Mrs. Carl Barlow, Washougal, Wn.; a stepson, Roy O. Akers of Portland; two granddaughters; two great grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews.
