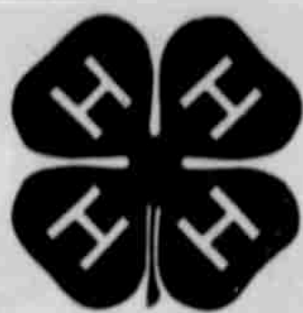


Morrow County

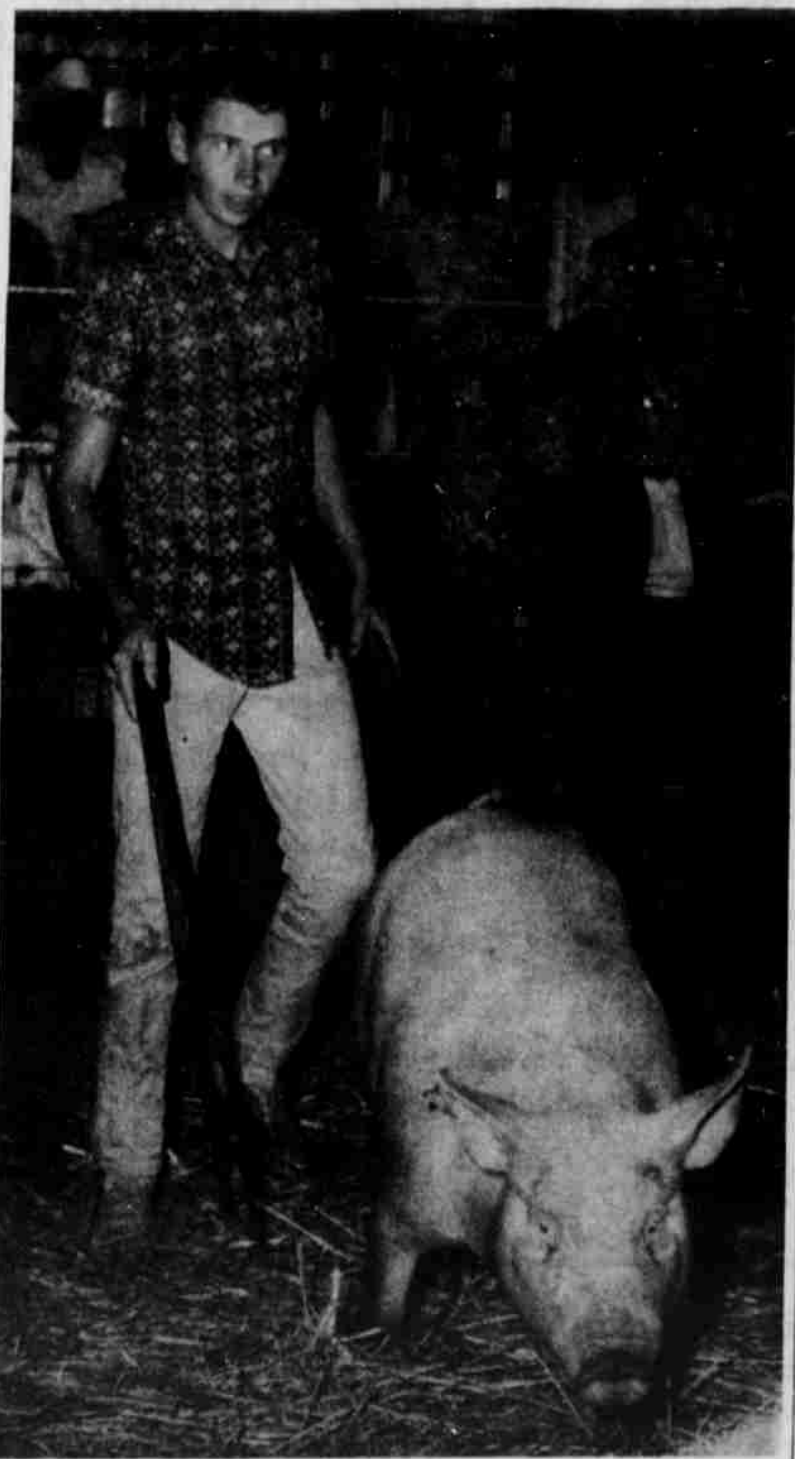
