Culture of Greece Subject of Program For Soroptimist Club

Greece, with its traditions, color and history, was the theme of the program of the Soroptimist Club at last Thursday's luncheon meeting.

A most interesting study of ancient and modern Greece was presented by Mrs. Emil Groshens and Mrs. W. J. Thomas, who are co-chairman of the International Goodwill and Understanding committee. Mrs. Groshens showed a color film, with the narration by Vincent Price, of the ancient and modern buildings, theaters, peoples, places and customs. It was noted that the methods of spinning and weaving appear to be much the same today as in the past.

Mrs. Thomas added background, some of it from her personal observation when touring Greece, of the many refugee camps there. She pointed out that some of the inhabitants of these camps have been living in them for over 20 years.

She also discussed the Soroptimist International Association's contribution to funds for the education of these people, and the refugee fund which is used to assist with the work of the refugee camps. They also sponsor a refugee camp near Innsbruck, Austria, and assist in the work of the camp there.
