

# Lillie Warner, Ex-Postmaster, Dies

IRRIGON—Lillie B. Warner was born in Ottumwa, Iowa, September 25, 1876, and died September 22, 1965 at the Good Shepherd hospital, Hermiston, at the age of 89.

The Warner family moved to the Irrigon community in 1919 from Grants Pass, and Mrs. Warner taught the primary grades in the Irrigon school several years. She later taught the school in the Alpine District, and she was postmaster in Irrigon 15 years before her retirement in 1949.

She is survived by two sons, Harvey C. Irrigon, and Walter R. Portland, and one daughter, Mrs. Mabel Rand, Irrigon. There are nine grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

Funeral services were Saturday, September 25, at the Irrigon Assembly of God church with the Rev. John H. Kenney officiating. Burial was in the Desert Lawn Memorial cemetery, Irrigon.
