

Cardinals Whack Weston, 14 to 6, For First Win

Two touchdowns and a safety against a lone touchdown gave lone a 14-6 victory over Weston in a football game at Weston Friday afternoon. It was the Cardinals' first win this year, their first game being a loss to Dufur.

Mark Halvorsen figured in all scoring plays for the Cardinals. He made the only points of the first half when he went over after lone had worked the ball within the one-yard line in the second quarter.

This made it 6-0 and it stayed that way through intermission.

A Weston player brought consternation to the Cardinal ranks when he took the opening kickoff of the second half and galloped 85 yards to score. This tied it 6-6.

The deadlock was broken in the third quarter when lone scored a safety after being stopped on the one-yard line. Attempting to get the ball out, a Weston back was nailed in the end zone by Halvorsen and Leland Magill, and this brought two points to the lone squad, making it 8-6.

Later in the third quarter, Halvorsen rolled out, and although he was hit by virtually every Weston griddler, he made it through the pack and scored on a 28-yard run for an insurance touchdown.

Coach Gordon Meyers was pleased with the victory, saying that his freshmen played a good game and bolstered the team. Eddie Sherman and Keith Nelson, sophomores, did excellent work as ends on offense and defensive halfbacks.

Eddie also intercepted a pass and ran it back 15 yards. Monte Crum proved a top ground gainer for the Cardinals, working with Halvorsen. Punting of Jay Ball was outstanding, the coach said. He got off one 60-yard kick and two others good for 45 yards.

Weston played "good heads-up ball," the coach said. However, the only threat besides their touchdown was halted on the lone 20.

The Cardinals made 104 yards rushing and also 104 yards passing in the game.

Traffic Survey Set On Highway Route

A Federal-State sponsored origin and destination traffic survey will be conducted at four interview stations in the Boardman-Pendleton area from now through October 8 in connection with the proposed location of Interstate 82.

Because the information to be gathered is so important to highway planning and beneficial to the motorists, it is essential that motorists give full cooperation to the interviewers, Forest Cooper, Oregon state highway engineer, explained.

"Motorists are asked to continue to use the routes that they normally use," Cooper said. "A maximum delay of only 30 seconds will be needed for the interviewers to obtain the necessary information."

This survey will help determine the final location of the route.

McCormack Construction Company of Pendleton is the apparent low bidder for a building addition to Pacific Northwest Bell's dial office on East Street in Lexington, according to Dale Slusher, local manager for the phone company.

The Pendleton contractor's bid was \$4,600.

Construction of the 11 foot by 16 foot wood frame addition is scheduled to start about October 4 and complete December 15, 1965.

The building addition will house new local and long distance calling equipment to meet area growth.

Mrs. Batty Dies At Coast Town; Services Today

Mrs. Jessie Vialletta Batty, a resident of Morrow county since 1915, died Monday, September 27, at the age of 84 years.

She had been visiting at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Beulah Ogletree near Brookings, and apparently suffered a heart attack. She had been in failing health and a patient in Pioneer Memorial hospital at various times during the past year.

She was born February 23, 1881, at Monmouth. Her marriage to Joseph Batty was in The Dalles on October 18, 1901. They came to Morrow county in 1915, where they took up farming in the Hardman area, and made their home there until after his death in 1946.

Mrs. Batty was a member of Sans Souci Rebekah lodge No. 32, Heppner, and of the First Methodist church.

Funeral services were held today (Thursday) at 2:00 p.m. at the Methodist church, with the Rev. Melvin Dixon officiating. Interment was in the Heppner Masonic cemetery, with Sweeney Mortuary in charge of the arrangements.

Surviving are her daughter, Mrs. Ogletree of Brookings; four sons, Lewis of La Grande, Kenneth of Heppner, Raymond of Klamath Falls, and Gilbert of Brookings. Also numerous grandchildren.

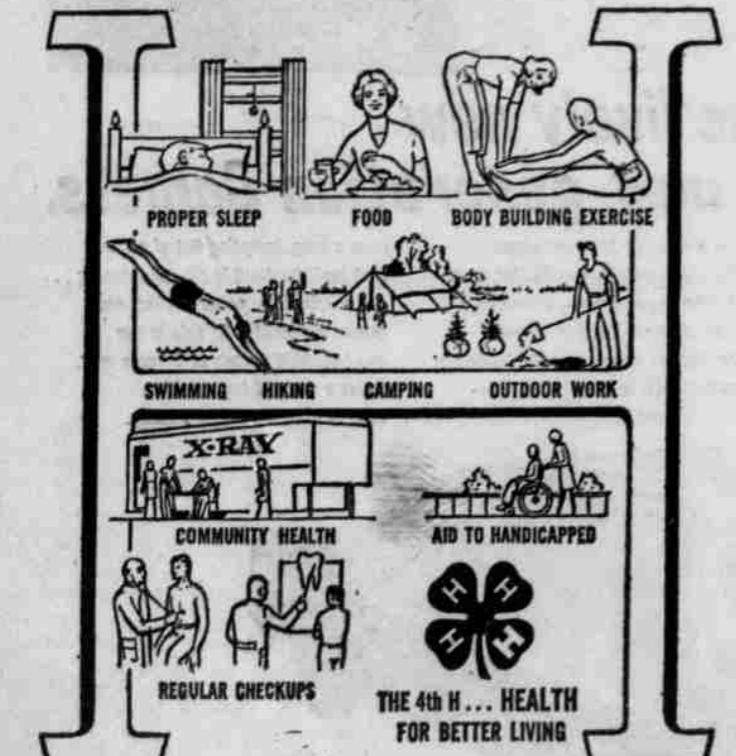

4-H Youths Keep Fit

When boys and girls club work first started in the early 1900's, the emblem was a 3-H clover symbolizing Head, Heart, Hands. Around 1911 the 4th H was added to represent Health. Ever since, both here and in about 75 other countries, this emblem has represented the equal training of "head, heart, hands and health for better living."



Health projects have grown over the years in knowledge, activities and membership, says the Cooperative Extension Service which supervises 4-H programs. And keeping fit is one important segment of the national 4-H Health program which today enrolls some 677,000 boys and girls.

It is easy to keep in good shape during summer months through sports, games, hikes, camping and outdoor work. But, cautions the 4-H Health bulletin, there is more to maintaining good health than strenuous exercise.

This recent publication points out the need for three nutritious meals a day, plenty of sleep, periodic physical checkups and a sensible balance of work and play. It also urges 4-H Club members to look for ways to improve family and community health.

Individual members and clubs can win awards for doing an outstanding job. Winners are selected by the Extension Service. Award donor and sponsor of the 4-H Health program for the last 10 years is E.H. Lilly and Company.
