

# Martin Chosen as National Delegate

IONE—Fredrick T. Martin has accepted an invitation to represent the United Church of Christ at an important North American conference of "The Ministry of the Laity in the World." The National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA and the Canadian Council of Churches are joining together at this conference as part of the ecumenical program of the World Council of Churches.

The meetings will convene in Chicago January 13 to 16. The invitation was extended by Ben W. Herbster, president of the United Church of Christ, with headquarters in New York.

Martin is an outstanding church layman in Oregon, having served in 1961 as vice-moderator and then moderator of the following year of the Mid-Columbia Association. He served as representative from the association on the conference commission on Church and Ministry.

This year Martin was elected by the state conference to the same commission as representative at large and is now serving as vice-chairman of the commission. He has been moderator of the local church, church school superintendent, adult teacher, and a delegate to annual conferences and regional laity conferences. He has served on the board of trustees, as a deacon, and sang many years in the church choir.

Previous to coming to Ione, Martin was a member of the Methodist Conference Commission on building and camp sites. He served ten years on the Conference Board of Christian Education.

Martin served as chairman of the Morrow county school reorganization committee and was a member and later chairman of the Morrow county school

board. He is an active member of the Oregon State school board association, and a member of the Ione City Council.

Dr. Errett Hummell of Portland was a week-end hunting guest of Mr. and Mrs. John Eubanks.

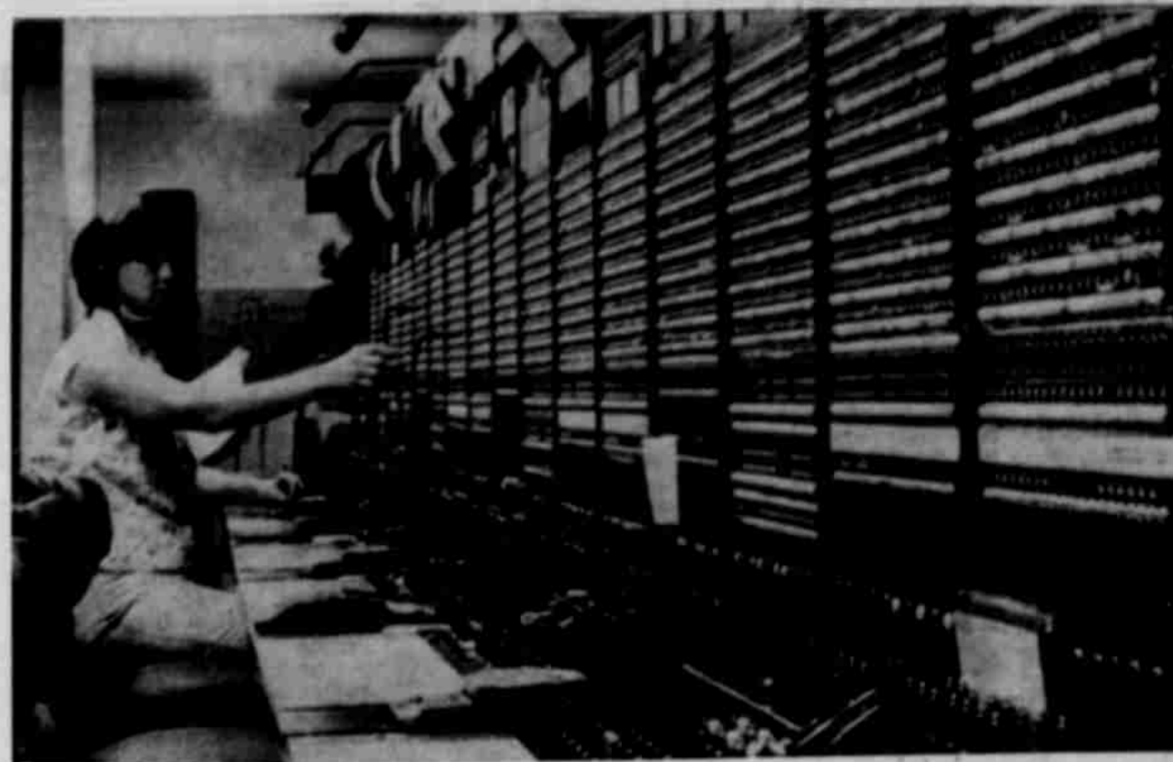
