

State Fair Sets Date for '66 Event

The 1966 Oregon State Fair will be held August 28 through Labor Day, September 5, next summer. It was announced in Salem today by Mrs. Marion T. Weatherford, chairman of the State Fair Commission.

The racing program for the '66 Fair will begin on Saturday, August 27, at 1:30 p.m., one day in advance of the official opening of the Fair in order to allow for a full eight-day racing schedule.

The dates of the '66 Fair are similar to this year's "Centennial" State Fair which began on August 29 and ran through Labor Day, Sept. 6.

Madras Tips Heppner With 2nd Half Spurt

Heppner High school's football team had a good thing going here Friday night at the rodeo grounds, but the tables were turned in the second half by the White Buffaloes of Madras, and the Mustangs found themselves on the short end of a final 20-13 score.

In the first half, the boys of Coach Jim Potter rolled merrily along as if the White Buffaloes were only some slight nuisance to contend with. They threatened in the first period after blocking a Madras punt, but couldn't reach paydirt.

In the second quarter, the Mustangs took off from their 22 yard line and, aided by a 15 yard penalty against Madras, reached the Buffaloes' 15. With it fourth down and five to go, Tom Driscoll took a pitchout and weeringly kicked the extra point, making it 7-0.

Shortly after the Mustangs came roaring back, and inspired by a 25-yard run by Ken Morgan, had the ball with a first down on Madras' 6 1/2 yard line. But they didn't succeed in getting it over in four tries and lost this opportunity—one that they would sorely need later on.

But they weren't to be denied. After holding the Buffaloes, Jim Doherty spiraled a 30-yard pass to Morgan that brought the Mustangs to the Madras 3. Jim Jacobs, back in good form following his injury, punched through to score from there. The extra point was another kick try by Murray but it was blocked.

At this point Madras mustered a late first half drive that, by fits and jerks, brought them a touchdown, although it nearly trickled out several times. They started a march in their own territory. Heppner held them just across midfield, but on one fourth down play, the Mustangs were called for pass interference when a Mustang accidentally hit a would-be receiver and dumped him to the ground. This gave the thrust new life.

A couple of plays later, on a pass reception, the Madras receiver dropped the ball, and Heppner recovered but the official ruled that the ball had been whistled dead, so the Buffaloes had another crack at it.

Finally, from the 20-yard line, with the first half running out, Rich Priddy pitched a pass to Kevin O'Neill in the end zone, and Madras was on the score board. Bob Smith passed to Allen Kollen for the point, and a different ball game was underway.

Around about this time, Heppner had nine first downs to its credit against one for Madras, but it was a different herd of Buffaloes that came out in the second half. They controlled the ball through most of the second half and made two more touch-

downs on passes while holding the home eleven scoreless.

The second Madras touchdown was set up on a beautiful run early in the third that started as a pass play from the Buffaloes' 13-yard line. The pass went to the right, and the receiver cut back across field while his teammates set up blocking. He finally reached the south sidelines and headed west towards paydirt. Madras blockers mowed down the Mustangs in neat rows, and the ball packer sailed on. From out of nowhere, however, came Morgan and Driscoll, apparently getting up after once being downed, and Driscoll stiffened and appeared to have held until on fourth down. Kollen passed to O'Neill who took it low on his knees in the end zone. Jim Doherty had no chance to prevent the reception as he attempted the pass defense. John Kiser caught a pass for the extra point, and it was Madras 14, Heppner 13.

Madras nailed the lid on the victory in the fourth quarter on another one of those low, almost indefensible passes that O'Neill picked off in the end zone. Doherty again was unable to prevent the shootop catch. Point try was no good, and that was the final score, 20-13.

Heppner had other good chances to score, but couldn't put them over. Coach Jim Potter said later that signal mix-ups stalled them a time or two on these good chances.

Madras finished with 12 first downs to 10 for Heppner, reversing the first half completely. The visitors gained 190 yards rushing and 70 passing while Heppner had 137 and 70 for a total of 207. Jacobs gained 61 yards on 14 carries for a 4.3 average and Driscoll had 53 yards on 11 carries for 4.8. David Gray made 11 tackles to top the defense while Driscoll had eight.
