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## Africa Calling

A REPORT FROM THE NEAR EAST

Yesterday was Election Day for the Western Region of Nigeria so I thought I would write and let you know how things are done in Nigeria. Nigeria has five regions, divided as to location. We are in the Western Region, which has Ibadan as the capital. Each region has its own House of As-

sembly and can hold an election whenever the party in power sees fit.

On the 18th of September, the NNPP, a coalition government of the NNA and NPC, called for an election. Since then, the tension has been mounting because an election is a big thing here. The opposing party is the UPGA, a coalition party formed from the NCNC and AG. Most of the Nigerian students here are for UPGA but the results announced so far give NNPP a very large majority. There are 94 constituencies in the Western House of Assembly and so far NNPP has 37, UPGA 5. NNPP is Nigerian National Democratic Party and UPGA is United People's Grand Alliance.

Sunday the electoral officer for the Western Region and a minister were shot by an unknown assailant. He also shot two other men and they are in critical condition at the University Hospital. Since then the police have been searching everyone's car for arms. The school's little bus was stopped and everyone had to get out while it was searched.

So the last week has been pretty eventful and more is still to come when the final tallies are announced. Already the UPGA has accused the NNPP of fixing the election so we might have some real fireworks. There are about 3,000 police in the city but even then it would be a pretty bloody place.

We heard that Heppner beat PR, 25-7; Condon, 31-0; and Hermiston JV, 21-0, but other than that not much. How is Jim Jacobs doing with his shoulder? Let's hope he gets well quick.

Doug is down in bed with a case of mumps, flu and a cold all together. He is by himself in a room here and he must stay there for two weeks at least. I visit him every day and bring him something to read but he is still pretty bored.

We haven't gotten a Gazette yet, but there should be some pretty shortly. Well, I guess that's all for now.
