"U. S. Savings Bonds sales in this County totaled \$5,661 in September," Morrow County Savings Bonds Chairman John Venable reported here today.

"Sales throughout the state amounted to \$2,285,596 for the month as compared to \$2,236,582 for the same period a year ago.

"National sales for September are \$342,000,000," he said.

"Holdings of Series E and Series H U. S. Savings Bonds nationally are at an all-time high of 48 billion, 994 million," he continued.

When asked about the steady increase in Bond holdings, the Chairman said, "We attribute the popularity of Savings Bonds to maximum safety and built-in tax deferral privileges which are attracting those who are building funds for the education of children, for their own retirement, and for future emergencies."

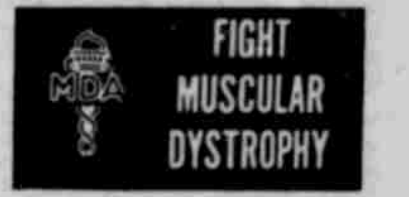
