Mustangs Named All-stars

Eight Heppner High school football players were selected as all-stars in the western division of the Greater Oregon league at a coaches meeting in Madras early this week, four being named to the offensive squad and five to the defensive squad. One, Tim Driscoll, was chosen for both offense and defense.

Driscoll and Jim Doherty were both unanimous choices for the offensive unit, and Mark Murray and David Gray were unanimously named to the defensive unit.

Driscoll, a senior halfback, is one of the league's leading ground gainers and tops the circuit in scoring. Doherty, versatile junior quarterback, has been an outstanding performer all year and added an extra threat in the Mustangs' attack this year with his fine pass pitching ability.

Murray, a senior tackle, has been one of the big reasons that Heppner has been able to hold opposition to 52 points while piling up 154 points in the eight games to date. He has been a consistently good tackler and added another spark to the Mustangs with his placekicking of extra points this year.

Gray, another senior, has been characterized by his hard defensive play and ranked high in number of tackles made. He also had moments of glory on offense. In the Sherman county game he picked up a fumble and ran 97 yards to score and also gathered in a touchdown pass in the same game.

Five Get Mention

Gaining honorable mention on offense were Mark Brown, senior end, and Jim Jacobs, senior fullback. Brown has been a strong performer through the season both on offense and defense, and Jacobs, out from an injury through the first part of the season, was outstanding in the backfield in later games. Had he been in the lineup through the season, it would seem likely that he would have made the all-star team.

Mickey Kindie, senior tackle, David Hall, sophomore quarterback, and Driscoll all gained honorable mention on the defensive choices. Kindie was a particular stalwart on defense

and led the team in tackling in a number of its games. Hall, a youngster with lots of promise, is a versatile football athlete and filled several positions through the season. Despite his small size, he has jarred many an opponent with his tackles. Driscoll, strong on pursuit, has saved his team from a number of opponents' touchdowns with his tackle when runners or pass catchers broke free, and he has also been in the thick of the fray on shorter running plays by the opposition.

13 On Offense Squad

The league's offensive team has 13 players because of some ties in the voting. Joining Heppner's Driscoll and Doherty in the backfield are four other outstanding western division players, Rus Kawalski and Butch Kinder of Burns, Jack Cherry of Wahtonka and Kent Thomas of Sherman County.

Linesmen on the offensive team are Kevin O'Neill of Madras, who was outstanding against Heppner when the White Buffaloes played here, and Mike Patrick of Sherman, ends; Bill Hammell of Wahtonka and Randy Wenick of Burns, tackles; Ron Lang of Grant Union and Grant Gunderson of Burns, guards; and Terry Way, Wahtonka, center.

12 Named to Defense

Besides Gray at corner line-backer and Murray at tackle on the defensive team, are the following first team selections: Jim Lindley of Grant Union and Gordon Proctor, Wahtonka, ends; Dave Emmons, Wahtonka, tackle; Bill Hammell, Wahtonka, guard; Tom Skiens, Burns, Mike Alsop, Sherman, and DeWayne McLaughlin, Wahtonka, inside linebackers; Dick Callentino, Burns, corner linebackers; and Mike Virgil, Burns, and Danny Thompson, Wahtonka, safeties.

Besides the Heppner players, the following received honorable mention on offense: Danny Thompson, Wahtonka, end; Jack Kramer, Madras, and Greg O'Meara, Sherman, tackles; Skeet Brander, Sherman, DeWayne McLaughlin, Wahtonka, and Mike Chamness, Madras, guards; Rod Hillman, Burns, center; Gary Ricketts, Wahtonka,

Dan Jensen, Sherman, and Mike Figg, Burns, quarterbacks; Rich Priddy, Madras, halfback; and Larry Kindrick, Wahtonka, and Dennis Reynolds, Grant Union, fullbacks.

In addition to the Heppner players, the following received honorable mention on defense: John Fenley and Darrell Pierce, Burns, Terry Stark and Harold Owens, Sherman, and Jim Crowley, Madras, ends; Randy Wenick, Burns, Skeet Brander, Sherman, and Dave Mallman, Madras, tackles; Tom Smoot, Madras, guard; Alvin Kollen, Madras, Mike Brice, Wahtonka, and Tom Hunnington, Grant Union, inside linebackers; Carl Puffer, Madras, corner line-backer; Bill Williams, Grant Union, and Mike Patrick, Sherman, safeties.

For the first team all-stars on offense and defense, Wahtonka led in the number of selections with a total of eight; Burns was second with seven; Heppner was third with four; Sherman was fourth with three; Grant Union was fifth with two and Madras placed one.

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Cards Outlast Late Rally To Edge Wheeler, 24-20

Gridmen of Lone High saw an 18 point halftime lead melt down to four points when they played Wheeler county at Fossil Friday night, but they held out and brought home a 24-20 victory to finish their regular season.

They found Wheeler to be a formidable opponent with a squad of big gridmen, including a 200-pound halfback. Size of the losers seemed to take a toll towards the end of the game, and the Fossil lads tallied two touchdowns in the final period to bring anxiety to the Morrow county boys.

To the Cards, tragedy came in the game when Mark Halvorsen, quarterback, suffered a broken finger and had to leave the contest. If they had their choice, they probably would much rather have lost the game than to lose Mark on the eve of their state playoff bid against Mitchell.

In the first half, Lone, although outweighed by the home team, outplayed the Wheeler squad, opening with two first quarter touchdowns. Halvorsen caught a 7-yard pass from Jay Ball for the opening six points, and Halvorsen later in the period fired an 18-yarder to Eddie Sherman for another six points. None of the lone conversion attempts succeeded in the game.

In the second quarter, Bob Baker took a 22-yard pass from Halvorsen, and the intermission found the Cardinals ahead, 18-0. At this juncture the tide started to turn. Wheeler opened the third quarter with a touchdown on a running play, but Lone countered with what was to be its game-winning score, a 12-yard pass to the end zone to Sherman from Halvorsen.

Going into the fourth, it was thus 24-6. Wheeler struck on a pass for a second touchdown and converted the point, making it 24-13, and they came right back on a run and extra-point conversion to bring it to the final 24-20 count.

Wheeler had previously beaten Dufur, the only team that vanquished Lone this year—that in the opening game of the season at Dufur.

"They had a big ball club, and a good ball club," Coach Meyers said. "They were fired up and moved the ball well. We played as fine a game as we played all season in the first half."

Penalties hit the Cards at some points in the game and might have stifled other scoring opportunities.

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
