

Fruit Cake Sale To Start Drive For Hospital Aid

A fruit cake sale, sponsored by Beta Omega chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha, Ione, will be held during Crazy Days, Friday and Saturday, in front of Gardner's Men's Wear and also in Ione to initiate a campaign for funds to buy a water softener for Pioneer Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. June Lindstrom, chairman of the sorority's ways and means committee, said that \$1985 will be needed to purchase the water softener, and the campaign for funds will continue until the money is raised.

Contributions are welcomed. A progress report will be kept in Bristow's store in Ione and Gardner's in Heppner.

The sorority will sponsor other money-raising events through the year to go to the water softener project.

Will O'Hara, administrator at the hospital, said that the water softener is one of the primary needs at the hospital at the present time. A display in Gardner's window shows how pipes in the building have been clogged with minerals, and in some instances, have had to be cut out and replaced. A water softener is expected to correct this condition he said.

The water softener will not be purchased until all the money is raised, and then the hospital will call for bids on it.

Mrs. Lindstrom and Mrs. Betty Hauser, president of the chapter, said that this is Beta Omega's philanthropic project for the year. Proceeds of a dinner that they will sponsor at the Ione Community Bazaar on December 12 will go to the project.

The public is invited to help kick-off the drive in good shape by purchasing fruit cakes during Crazy Days.

Pomeroy Final Mustang Opponent

Final football game for the season for Heppner High's Mustangs will be at Pomeroy, Wn., Friday night at 7:30. This is a non-league game, and the Mustangs will hang up their suits for the year after it goes into the record books.

Little is known about the opposition except that the Pomeroy eleven defeated Waitsburg, 20 to 13, in its last outing. Coach Jim Potter of the Mustangs said.

The Heppner eleven showed its potential in a game two weeks ago at Burns, winning 26 to 6, and trounced Sherman here Friday in the home finals, 26 to 7.
