IN THE COUNTY COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON FOR THE COUNTY OF MORROW

In the Matter of NORTH MORROW COUNTY IRRIGATION DISTRICT

PETITION FOR THE ORGANIZATION OF AN IRRIGATION DISTRICT

TO: The HONORABLE PAUL JONES, Judge of the County Court of Morrow County, Oregon.

We, the undersigned, Petitioners, constituting a majority of the owners of land, respectfully represent that each of us is the holder of title to lands, of one acre or more, who are bona fide entrymen or claimants to unoccupied land under the Laws of the United States, or the State of Oregon, situated within the boundaries hereinafter described, all being duly qualified electors, under the Laws of the State of Oregon for organizing Irrigation Districts, and that the lands within said boundaries are situated in Morrow County, Oregon, and are susceptible to irrigation from a common source, or combined sources, and designed to provide for the construction of works for the irrigation of the same, for the purpose of irrigation and the reclamation of said lands, hereby Petition your Honorable Court as follows:

That it is the purpose of the undersigned Petitioners to organize an Irrigation District, comprising the bounded and described lands specifically described in Appendix "A" attached hereto, and by reference made a part hereof, under the provisions of said Act.

The Petitioners accompany their Petition with and hereby present, for the approval of this Court, a good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$2500.00, which is double the amount of the probable cost of organizing such District, conditioned that the Bondsman would pay all of said costs in case said organization be not effected.

WHEREFORE, your Petitioners pray that this Court approve the said bond, and that said Irriga-

tion District be organized under the provisions of said Act, and that this Court shall make and enter an Order, establishing and defining the boundaries of such Irrigation District; determining whether the requisite number of owners of land within such proposed District shall have Petitioned, and whether the Petition, and Notice of a time for the presentation thereof, shall have been duly published as in said act provided; and designating the name of said District; that this Court proceed to call an election for the purposes above set forth, and establish a constituted number of Election Precincts in said proposed District, and defining the boundaries thereof, designating the time and places for holding said elections; and to do all things necessary, as may be just and proper under said Law for the formation of said District.
