Seniors to Take SAT Tests December 4

Scholastic Aptitude Tests for Heppner High School will be held Saturday, December 4. This test is to be taken by all students intending to go to college or technical schools.

Many colleges require the S.A.T. for entrance. For many of these same colleges the test serves as the entrance exam and if you have taken it you will not have to take the entrance exam that school requires. The State Scholarship Commission also uses the S.A.T. scores in order to select persons to receive scholarships.

They use these scores because the same test is administered all over the United States and in this way they get a true representation of the capabilities of each applicant. If they didn't choose scholarship recipients this way, students from small schools (where there is little competition and it is easier to get a high GPA than it would be in a large school with lots of competition), would have an advantage over the students from larger schools.

In getting scholarships the test is of utmost importance. If a student has a low GPA and gets a high score on the test he will have a better chance of getting state and national scholarships, than if he has a high GPA and a low score on the test. It is unlikely that he would get a high score if he has a low GPA.

Help is being given seniors in preparing for this test by Mrs. Dick in the reading classes.
