Area Manager Presents Phone Franchise Plan

IRRIGON—Dale Slusher of Pendleton, area manager for Pacific Northwest Bell, was at the Irrigon Council meeting Tuesday evening to discuss the proposed telephone franchise. The franchise, which provides for 2% of revenues derived from telephones within the city limits to be refunded to the city, was read in full and by title at the council meeting, and adopted. The franchise will be in effect for 20 years, but may be terminated at the end of ten years by the option of either party.

Slusher stated the telephone company is planning to improve its service in this area by reducing the present setup of 8-party lines to a 4-party line with individual ring. This improvement is expected to occur in 1966.

In other council business, the Rural Fire District was offered access to the Chevron garage and service station, recently purchased by the City of Irrigon, to house a fire truck through the winter months.
