

## Many Enter Christmas Exhibits To Thrill Viewers at 2-Day Show

IONE — "Everywhere, everywhere Christmas" was the theme of the first Ione Garden Club Christmas show and silver tea at the Rebekah Hall in Lexington on Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

Over 185 guests enjoyed the beautiful displays entered by 49 exhibitors in the seven divisions. Of these 31 were adults and 18 were junior exhibitors. Eight community organizations competed in the "Festive Board," a table setting division.

The grand sweepstakes award was presented to Mrs. Garry Tullis for the most blue ribbons in the adult division. Kathy Crum won the junior division sweepstakes prize.

Judges for the excellent show were Mrs. Kay Hisatomi, Pendleton, and Mrs. Letha Myers, Hermiston, accredited judges. Mrs. Myrtle Bocoline, Anchorage, Alaska, a student judge accompanied them.

The judges chose Mrs. Tullis' arrangement "Uncle Art's Christmas" as the "best of the show" for the adults. She had used an old pair of cowboy boots sprayed gold, a piece of rope, pine boughs and cones fashioned into a Christmas arrangement.

Bobette Jones of Heppner was junior sweepstakes ribbon winner with the best arrangement in the junior division. She had made little figures for a handmade wreath from colored spoils of thread.

Many, many ideas were presented to viewers for making their own home decorations for the holidays. A wide variety of material and ingenuity went into the displays.

In the use of one candle in an arrangement the first place was awarded to Mrs. Bob Jones using fresh plant material and to Mrs. Rietmann for other material; use of two or more candles and fresh material to Mrs. Tullis; and to Mrs. Riley Munkers for a mantel arrangement.

Other blue ribbons for arrangements went to Mrs. Tullis for entrance hall; Mrs. Wolff for coffee table; Mrs. Munkers for kitchen; Mrs. Fred Martin and Mrs. Ralph Crum for corsages. Package wrapping winners were Betty Henderson for a child, and Mrs. Martin for a mother.
